Forty-five persons have helped so far and the co-chairmen wish to thank them for their efforts. They especially express their appreciation to those who are not members, but friends of the society, who gave time to this project. Wells stated, "We have no idea how many hours have been put into this project, but at Eastside alone it took 290 hours to record the burials.

It is estimated 18,000 names are yet to be recorded. Following that comes the alphabetizing and typing.

The history of the carly days of our Kansas Post Offices

Being confined to the house (snow bound) these first weeks of January 1979, I was introduced to a most interesting book "Kansas Fost Offices" compiled by Robert W. Baughman and published by the Kansas State Historical Society in 1961.

Having collected stamps as a boy and still having my collection, this "kid" learned new items and relearned old items about the Louisiana Purchase. This purchase, made from France in 1803 for the sum of fifteen million dollars, covered that vast territory from west of the Mississippi River to the Rocky Mountains and from Canada to the Gulf of Mexico. There were no scheduled means of transportation nor of sending or receiving mail. When one crossed the Mississippi River and traveled 100 miles west, you were right out in the boondocks, surrounded by buffalo.

Eight pre-territorial post offices were established before the organization of the Kansas Territory, May 30, 1854.

Harysville, Kansas was also the home base of the now famous Pony Express Mail Service. The stone building, quartering both men and ponies under one roof, has been restored and is now a worth seeing museum.

It is the hopes of this writer that space will be granted in future issues to browse through this most interesting book and learn of towns that had flourishing businesses and busy post offices; but now the town and all it's buildings are gone. Nothing remains to mark the spot where grandma once got her mail. (Note: If you have a letter mailed from one of these towns and the cancellation mark is in good condition, please take it out of the box of stamps or packet of old letters where you now have it and have the entire envelope laminated between two sheets of plastic—you have a very valuable item.

Since we named curselves the Renc County Genealogical Society, let us review those towns in Reno County that once were, but are now gone without a trace.

Note: When an * accompanies "from", both the name and the site were changed.

An * after the recorded date, the name of the office became the one stated in the name changed column.


