MEET JESSE KING

So he met this Dresden Doll beauty at a National Guard camp. It seems he had no regular girl friend. The rest of the crowd did. When the girls decided to visit the camp, one of them took the future Mrs. Jesse King along. One look and he forgot all about escaping by being assigned to picket line duty. Jesse E. King and Edith C. Smith were married on 28 February 1937 in the sanctuary of the Trinity Methodist Church. King was a shoe salesman at the time—fell into that kind of work because of the pitfalls of the depression.

Jesse was born on 4 April 1909 at Humboldt where his mother, an ordained minister, had been appointed pastor in 1907. (He has been told the doctor charged \$5 for the home delivery). The family had returned to Hutchinson by 1910 where King's father took some additional schooling and in 1912 was appointed pastor of a church at Bentley.

Boyhood memories include dismantling windup clocks and making sunflower threshing machines. Also tending the garden and selling produce door to door.

Jesse is a product of the Hutchinson public schools and Hutchinson Juco. He was active in forensics: Declamation, debate, oratory, plays and operettas.

While attending Juco he entered the field of advertising from which he was never to escape. For almost 40 years he was in the advertising departments of Kansas newspapers, 32 of those years with the Hutchinson News. Even in retirement he has done some nice printed advertising including full process color corporate brochures. In addition he is active in the sale of advertising specialties and gifts.

His delightful wife Edith was born in Hutchinson and raised in the Mitchell school community. She is an HHS graduate and attended Juco. She has been regent of the Uvedale Chapter of DAR and is completing her fifth year as treasurer of DAR. For many years she taught Sunday School at Trinity Methodist Church.

King has a 35 year veteran certificate as a Boy Scout leader; is past master of Bassett Lodge No. 124; is a Knight Templar; and is active in work of Trinity Methodist Church, having served and chaired several commissions.

In 1964 the General Board of National Missions of the Methodist Church asked the Kings to visit the Rio Grande (Spanish speaking) Conference and then prepare some materials to help raise a considerable sum of money. At present King is a Stephan Minister on the Pastoral Care Team at Trinity.

In 1957, while Public Relations chairman of the Kansas Council of Churches, King was writing advertising for the Kansas State Fair. The need for a State Fair church service surfaced so King organized the State Fair Worship Service and continued as chairman for 22 years.

He was the first vice-president of the Reno County Genealogical Society and is now serving as Publicity Chairman. He is also a member of the Reno County Council on Aging and served a spell as Reno County representative on the South Central Kansas Area on Aging.

The Kings have two sons: Edward, who has a Doctorate in Education and is a counsellor/administrator at the Shawnee Mission High School District. He recently retired from a 3 year term as president of the Greater Kansas City Mental Health Association. Edward is also a learning disabilities specialist.



A BOOK REVIEW

GENEALOGICAL CORRESPONDENCE

Everything you wanted to know about genealogical correspondence, but were afraid to ask, is contained in one book. This volume is entitled <u>Handbook for Genealogical Correspondence</u>, 2nd ed., by the Cache Genealogical Library (Logan, UT: The Everton Publishers, Inc., 1974).

The introductory portion of this book contains two arresting sentences. The first states, "From 50 to 70 percent of all genealogical connections are made by correspondence." This statement makes it clear why family researchers should learn to frame their letters in the most effective way. The second sentence is, "Everyone possesses some information which you do not have." For this reason, it is important to write often and to write clearly.

Fortunately, the book contains examples of correctly written letters as well as an outline of the six kinds of information that should be included in a genealogical letter. In addition to the tips for general correspondence, there are ideas for writing to church record keepers, public officials, libraries and public archives, newspaper editors and relatives. Among the tips on writing to relatives, there is a suggestion that the writer include a warm personal touch. For example, "Do you remember the day you and I fell out of Grandpa's cherry tree?" This personal approach is more likely to get a prompt reply.

Other helpful information can be found concerning geography in correspondence, the libraries of England and Wales, letters to an editor, a file of correspondence, etc. These, of course, are only some of the aids to correspondence found in this valuable book that every family researcher should examine.

Although the <u>Handbook for Genealogical Correspondence</u> can be found in the Hutchinson Public Library, it might be a book a researcher would like to purchase for his personal collection. At any rate, if you consult this book often, you will know about genealogical correspondence whether or not you were afraid to ask.
