COVERED BRIDGES Past & Present



There are in America today some 2,000 covered bridges; some still in use, others hiding out their declining years just beyond their modern replacements. Thirty-three states cherish these romantic links with a more leisurely past. Pennsylvania leads with 390 followed by Ohio 349, Indiana 174, Oregon 149 and Vermont with 121.

They were sometimes called "kissin' bridges" because it was considered all right to kiss one's sweetheart while passing slowly through that delightful dimness. For those without sweethearts or those with desires for more material things, they became "wishing bridges" because it was said that whatever one wished while passing through the bridge always came true.

Why were they covered? To keep the water out of the wood-pegged joints? To keep the roadway dry? To strengthen the entire structure? To give the bridge a barn-like appearance because farm animals, singly or in droves, frequently balked at crossing bridges where they could see the moving water? To keep the snow off--despite the fact that old records list men hired to "snow the bridge" so sleighs could cross? Take your choice. The actual reason might well be that these bridges were created by builders of barns who merely built barns over streams using the same wooden-pegged construction principles.

Many quite different types of stress supports were used on these 19th century bridges built of abundant white pine, a wood that was light in addition to being worm and weather resistant. Theodore BURR of Connecticut invented the use of solid, hewn timbers to form a continuous arch anchored in abutments at the shoulders of the bridge. When sawed planks became more plentiful, the solid Burr Arch was replaced by laminated ones, spliced at random.

Pennsylvania's Theodore Burr Covered Bridge Society honors this early builder. Headquarters are in Harrisburg, PA and anyone interested may join.

KANSAS PIONEER CERTIFICATES (See also February 1981 issue of Newsletter)

The KANSAS COUNCIL has announced an extension of the Certificate Program. Many Western Counties of Kansas did not open up for settlement until after 1880 and until now, many of those settlers would not be honored.

The EARLY SETTLERS Certificate will cover the years of 1 Jan 1881 - 31 Dec 1900. Sources for proof would be any two as required for Territorial and Pioneer Certificates.

RESEARCH HELPS AT THE LOCAL LDS LIBRARY

In the same spirit that material is offered for use, or accepted to be made available to others in the Sal+ Lake Genealogical Library and the Mormon Branch Libraries; the little Hutchinson LDS Ward Library offers what it has and accepts any materials donated by friends.

The Ward Library does not solicit or expect gifts however, it has received some. Equipment has also been purchased (from church funds) such as the microfische reader and films and good genealogical books.

Thousands of names which have been researched by church members world-wide, along with birth, marriage and death dates and places, as well as census records, are available right here in Hutchinson on the microfische.

The late Virginia McARTHUR, impressed with the efforts of the Hutchinson Ward to be of service, presented a 50 years collection of DAR Magazines, which contain a wealth of copied records. The material is old New England and Southern States documents with several other areas included.

Bible records; marriage bonds; church records; abstracts of wills; births and deaths; cemetery, tax, land and deed information; plus biographies, family histories and lengthy queries comprise the bulk of what is available in this valuable source.

Pansy JORDAN and Wilma LOGAN organized a guide which enables one to find the type of record and the locality. Therefore, use of the magazines is a pleasant adventure.

Helen L. HALL contributed a set of coats of arms with genealogical and biographical information. There is a similar large collection of arms; also a variety of research material and 'how to' books which include some with instruction on publishing and on writing a personal history. One title is "Putting Life in Your Life Story".

There are two little books of clipped obituaries of McPherson County and the Partridge Cemetery book compiled and presented by Malinda (CROTTS) PETERSON and Lillian (CROTTS) FRENCH are included in the offerings.

Due to lack of personnel the past two years, the above "research department" has not been made readily available; however, plans are to have it ready and regularly offered by the second Thursday in October.

The new location, 18 - 17th Crestview in the Faircrest addition (the former Crestview Bible Church) affords some private work space if desired. A problem at the smaller former church building was the distraction of enthusiastic and sometimes high volume of "genealogy talk" in the one room set-up.

The phone number is the same - 665-5081. Calling before coming in is a good idea as an occasional illness or other reason may sometimes prevent opening.

Hours for the "research department" will be 6:00 to 9:00 PM. The regular "service department" hours are 1:00 to 9:00 PM, on the second and fourth Thursdays of each month. Doris DALE will be on hand with personal suggestions from study of the papers and problems brought to her.

Doris goes to the branch library in Wichita each first and third Thursday. She often takes patrons over and helps them there. All the microfilm that is in the Salt Lake City Library is available (for a minimal charge) at the Wichita LDS Branch Library.

The LDS Church urges it's friends to use the genealogy work days because they are one of the ways in which the local ward can serve the community and the Hutchinson area.

DIRECTORY FOR RESEARCH IN KANSAS CITY

A directory of archival collections for the Kansas City area is available from the Kansas City Area Archivists. This 57 page publication includes 87 entries, each entry providing information about area archival repositories including days and hours of service, special services, restrictions to collection use, guides to holdings, scope and content as well as name, address, phone number and contact person.

In addition to including information about the larger more well-known institutions, the directory identifies the small repositories which are often overlooked in national directories. Entries are categorized according to Educational Institutions, Religious Institutions, Businesses, Federal, State and County, Cities, Museums, Historical Societies and others. An index is provided.

RENO COUNTY FAIRS

The first fair was 28-29 September 1875: three years after the county was organized; The year after the grasshopper raid. Crops that year were abundant.

Every effort possible was being made to attract the settlers. The Sante Fe Rail-road had its land and immigration department was pushing the sale of land along the railroad.

The first fair was little more than a reunion. There was no cash prizes or any charges. Horse racing in 1887.

The next year they elected L. J. Templin (a methodist preacher who came from Kokomo, Indiana) as secretary and general manager. A stalwart man in appearance, he was a genial, whole-souled man equally qualified to preach the gospel or handle a horse race. There was no gambling at the fair.

The present State Fair had its beginning 7 Feb 1901. A few men met at the Commercial Club rooms to talk over the advisability of organizing a fair association. A canvas was made shortly after this meeting, wherein it was agreed to raise money to start a fair.

Frank Fearl carried the subscription paper. The first signature was that of Matthew Smith and Mr. Fearl signed second. They secured 52 names.

A second meeting was held and the subscribers organized. Selected as President was F.F. Fearl; J.L. Spousler, secretary; directors were R.H. Halton, J.O. Patten, Thomas H. Foley, C.W. Peckham, H.S. Thompson, Henry Hartford, John M. Kinkel, John R. Price, W.H. Johnson, E. Rayl, W.H.S. Benedict, J.U. Brown, Matthew Smith and J. B. Talbot.

On 24 April the board of directors met and selected the following officers:
