THE PROBATE PACKAGE

"WHERE THERE'S NO WILL, THERE'S OFTEN A WAY" is the title of an article by Lois STANLEY and Maryhelen WILSON in the Fall 1984 issue of the St. Louis (MO) Genealogical Society's Quarterly.

Stanley and Wilson suggest asking for the "PROBATE PACKAGE" rather than the will an ancestor may or may not have left.

The probate package contains all the papers included in an estate. It's often possible to find a list of all those entitled to a share of the estate, distribution of the estate, claims against the estate, receipts for monies owed by the deceased and paid by the estate as well as papers supporting the fact that a will may have been contested.

The probate package may be found in the office of the Probate Clerk and will be listed on a probate index. You may even be able to personally examine the package.

Stanly and Wilson point out that there is a special satisfaction in looking at the packet and holding in your hand the very paper on which your ancestor signed (sometimes with an X) their name.

RENO COUNTY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY



THE STORY OF JESSE LEE RENO

Born in Wheeling, Virginia (now West Virginia) in 1823, Jesse Lee RENO was graduated from West Point in 1846 and almost immediately found himself fighting in the Mexican War of 1846-48. The new soldier fought bravely and was twice brevetted for his services in the battles there. [Brevet, the dictionary reports, is a commission which gives a military officer higher nominal rank than that for which he is paid].

Jesse was respectfully described long ago as having been a true warrior in time of war and a man of peace in peacetime. So it came to be that the bearded captain came to be an ordinance officer stationed at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas after the hostilities in Mexico ceased. And then the Civil War began.

Appointed brigadier general of volunteers in November 1861, Jesse commanded a brigade in Ambrose BURNSIDE's expedition to North Carolina, and in July 1862, the rank of major general was bestowed upon the young officer. Courageously, the new major general led the 9th Corps at the second battle of Bull Run where he fell mortally wounded on September 14, 1862. Both the battles there were felt to be victories for the Confederate Army, and one can wonder if our valiant hero died there with a higher rank than that for which he had been paid also. Still, his short life was not left completely unrewarded.

A bridge built in Nevada between Lake Tahoe and Pyramid Lake on the Donner Pass route to California and given the name of Lake's Crossing in 1860, was renamed to honor Jesse when the Central Pacific Railroad arrived in 1868.

And an area in Kansas was given his name when borders were established for a new county in 1867.

Today this stalwart officer's life, for the most part, lies buried between the pages of history's more recognized heros, but Major General Jesse Lee RENO's spirit lives on in Reno, Nevada and..Reno County, Kansas.

AN AUGENBLINCH


An arithmetic book written in 1824 by Nicholas ENGLER, who was the youngest son of my great-great grandfather, is written with a quill pen in German. It seems that in order to get out of school, he had to bind the book, make the ink, make the quill pen, as well as make up his arithmetic problems. It has been said that he was one out of five to get out of school that year in Saverland, Switzerland.


The introduction to the book reads, "The grand art of figuring rises as high as the heavens. She precedes justly the other arts. It originates from God who was the author of the angels, the stars, the flowers, the leaves and everything like that. Anyone who masters arithmetic is well on his way to learning many other arts, because you have to know it or you are very limited".

For one of his problems, he took the year 1824 and multiplied it by 52 weeks, seven days, 24 hours, 60 minutes, 60 seconds, a 60th of a second, then three augenblinchs.

There are three augenblinchs to a 60th of a second. An augenblinch is a blink of the eye, so in 1,824 years, there are 10,325,532,672,000 augenblinchs.

WHAT'S IN A NAME? IN SURNAMES, PLENTY!

Surnames surfaced almost 1,000 years ago in Europe to lend better descriptions to people. They were often related to the person's residence, occupation, or their parent's name (patronymic) or provided some type of personal description.

The more than one million American surnames range in meaning from Arsenault (in charge of weapon storage) to Zarzecki (dweller on the other side of the mountain).

Almost half of our surnames (40%) indicate place (Hill, Brooks, Meadow), 30% are patronymics (Johnson, Harris, Jones), 16% occupation, (Baker, Miller, Smith), 12% descriptive (Brown, Short, Longfellow) and 2% are others.

Surnames were not just randomly selected; there had to be some logical connection between the individual and the name in order for it to be remembered and used.

As people left Europe and migrated to the new country, the surnames they brought

with them often reflected the places they left behind. For example, Dumont, Maki, Zola, Jurek and Kopecky mean hill in France, Finland, Italy, Poland and Czechoslovakia.

Names referring to bodies of water would include Lake, Pond, Pool, Leake and Lynn in England, Kuhl in Germany and Loch in Scotland. Rivers is to Spain what Storm is to Sweden, and in England it's Brooks and Rivers.

Meadow, Meadows and Medow mean one lived in or near a field where grass was grown for hay. A Crane may have hailed from near the Crane river in England, Steins near a stone or rock, and Hayes from either a hedge or from Hayes, a common place name in England.

Sand, Sands and Sane were from Send (a sandy area) in Surrey. The areas of Moray (near the sea) and Wick (dairy farm) in Scotland produced Murry, Murray, Murrie and Wick, Wicke, Wicker.

Another popular way of identification was by the person's job. The most common occupational surnames in this country are Smith, Miller, Taylor, Clark, Walker, Wright, Baker, Carter, Stewart and Turner.

Smiths forged the metal the Wrights work-ked with. Bakers prepared bread from the grain the Millers ground. Walkers cleaned the clothing the Taylors made, while Carters drove the carts. Clarks served as



clerks, and Turners operated lathes, perhaps on the farms or estates the Stewarts were in charge of.

Carpenters built houses from the wood cut by the Carvers and the timber sawed by Sawyers, Shepherds tended sheep, Kellogs killed hogs, and Haywards were responsible for keeping the livestock from the fences and hedges.

Fishman sold the fish the Fishers caught. Corders and Ropers provided the cord and rope the Shermans and Shearers used to bind their cloth.

Franklin, a landholder, could have used Myer as an overseer, Berry as a servant, Spencer as a butler, Ward as a guard and Napier in charge of linen, and paid them the money that was made by Minter.

Many surnames are not totally original names, but patronymics—suffixes or prefixes added to the parent's name (usually the father's). For example, son indicated the male offspring in English, but it's poulos in Greek, wicz in Polish, ez in Spanish, ian in Armenian and sen in Danish and Norwegian.

Although prefixes such as Ap in Welsh, Fitz in Norman, and Mac in Scotch and Irish also indicate son, the Irish O means grandson.

Klein, Kurtz, Stutz and Wenig are German for the English Small or Short, while it could be Malek in Polish and Smail in

Scotch.

Long, Land and Longfellow are tall or large in English, but in French it's Le Grand or Grande, and Hoch or Feltz in German.

Bliss, Blyth, Merriman and Merriweather mean agreeable, pleasant; a Fairchild or Belcher was attractive or handsome; and Gentry, Curtis, Fine or Handy indicated a polite person.

A person's ancestor might have been bald if the last name is Ball, Baldwin or Ballard while Rounds, Major and Stuckey mean husky or plump.

Harper played the harp while Piper mastered a pipe. Meeks was a mild or humble person, and Bonney was a good and kind soul. Dory was a person with gold or blond hair, and Krause meant that a descendent had curly hair. A Winter was born during that season, and a Temple was an infant left there in England.

Although a surname may indicate a residence, occupation, parent's name or description and be shared with thousands of others, people usually find a way to make a name uniquely their own.

WHAT THIS REGIONAL SURNAME INDEX TELLS YOU:

- (1.) All families and individuals referred to here (by surname) lived in, or within close proximity of, the following existing "major gold region" counties sometime during the first century of westward migrations to the area -- roughly, between 1840 and 1940: Alpine. Amadur, Butte, Calaveras, Ei Dorado, Fresno, Madera, Mariposa, Merced, Monc, Nevada, Placer, Plumas, Sacramento, San Joaquin, Sierra, Stanislaus, Sutter, Tuclumne, Yuba.
- (2.) Every surname listed here refers directly to the "surnames-members-are-researching" card files of genealogical societies in, and within close proximity of (25 miles or so) the "major gold region" counties indicated.
- An asterisk (*) after the surname indicates a member can exchange "extensive information" on their family line. (Note: ALWAYS send a self-addressed stamped postcard or envelope when requesting an associated member & current address extraction from a societies' surname card file.)
