# **Those Moving Borders**

One of the biggest difficulties researching genealogists run into is trying to keep straight just which township or county or state their ancestors were living in at a particular time—sometimes not because the ancestors moved but because the borders did.

The Colonial Courier (Summer 1985, p. 10) says that boundaries of some of the New England states changed so that it is important for a researcher to know, for example, "that Maine, and a part of Rhode Island, were originally claimed by Massachusetts." New Hampshire claimed the area Vermont was in until about 1765. New York and Connecticut had disputed boundaries until around 1825.

The same source suggests that because of disputed boundaries between Pennsylvania and Maryland (until Mason and Dixon did their surveying) people who are certain their ancestors came from Maryland might do well to check the Adams County Courthouse at Gettysburg, Pa.

It's a good idea for any genealogist who is researching in early records to make a catalog of what the area was called at different times. Such a list on a  $3 \times 5$  card can be tucked into the old tote bag and carried into libraries and courthouses.

One family might have lived in the same area of Virginia from its earliest settlement, but they might have lived in both Washington and Scott counties, for example.

North Carolina was Albemarle originally (1663), but Pasquotank, Currituck, Perquimans, and Chowan counties were carved from Albemarle in 1670. Clarendon County existed only from 1664 to 1667. If you were searching the present Ashe County area, you would need to know that it was formed in 1799 from Wilkes (1798), which came from Surry (1771), which had been part of Rowan (1753), which split off from Anson (1750), previously a part of Bladen (1734), which came from New Hanover (1729), which was part of Craven (1712) which was the new name of Archdale (1705-1712), a part of Bath (1696-1705), one of the counties originally formed from Albemarle.

Now, if that doesn't thoroughly confuse you, nothing will. However, it makes the point that the researcher needs to have some idea of the different identifications an area has had, since records for one geographic spot may be housed in several different current-day counties.

It probably makes sense to begin a collection of maps of the areas in which a person is tracing ancestry and to become thoroughly knowledgable about the history of the area. # The Serendipity Genealogist

Serendipity (happy chance) genealogy works best, I discover, when I have time to get close enough to it for something to happen—whether by happy chance or plain hard work.

Occasionally, I have benefited by taking a deliberate break from genealogy activities just to let my motivation build up again. Usually after one of these short vacations I return to my happy hunting all refreshed and eager to write letters and read microfilm again.

My most recent break has been brought about by an extra assignment at work. This time I find myself extremely frustrated at having genealogy projects which are hanging fire simply because my time is occupied elsewhere.

Frustration is only one side-effect of this genealogy break. The worst part is that I have discovered when I do get a few minutes to work on my ancestor chasing I am no longer on top of my data the way I am when I work on it regularly. Also, forcing myself to work on it when I am fatigued makes it work instead of play and takes all the fun out of it.

This experience has brought to my attention some holes in my system. For example, I will no longer be so cavalier about making notes on my correspondence cards when I receive and answer letters. I actually answered one person twice because of this little oversight—not a satisfying way to spend precious time.

I think I had been counting on my good memory to get me by. When I work on my records daily, my memory still takes care of me, but a little distance from them and I can't find anything. (My clever son keeps telling me it isn't because I am busy that I forget things, but because I'm getting older.)

One more thing I have learned is that I really do need a computer for all the data I have collected. When I am rested and have time to do it, I don't mind retyping family histories when I have new facts to insert. When I'm short of time anyway, I really resent retyping 30 pages when a computer insertion of new greatnephews could be done in a second with a few keyboard strokes and a new history printed in a few minutes.

Serendipity is still at work for me; it is simply taking a new form these days.

# The Amish Settlement in Yoder Township Reno County, Kansas

The very last township to be organized in Reno County, Kansas, was Yoder Township. There was much controversy as to whether or not this township should be organized, but A.M. Switzer and others kept it before the board of county commissioners until it became a reality on 4 March 1915.

The new township was formed from parts of Lincoln, Clay and Haven townships; therefore, when searching for one's ancestors in the Yoder area prior to 1916, it is necessary to consider all three of these townships.

Amish families of the "Old Order" make up a substantial portion of Yoder Township. (There are other Amish in Reno County settled southwest of Hutchinson, but they are considered "new order," in that they drive cars and use electricity. A small group near Pleasantview still meets in homes for Sunday church. They use the horse and buggy only on Sunday.) Old Order Amish do not use electricity, and the horse and buggy are used extensively. They hold church in their homes.

The town of Yoder was named after Eli M. Yoder, an Amish man who came from Pennsylvania in 1874. He met and married Mary Young. She was not Amish, so he left the church. He bought a half section of land in the part of Lincoln Township that later became Yoder Township.

When the Missouri Pacific railroad came through his land, Eli M. Yoder donated a plot of land for a train station, with the understanding that the town would bear his name. There was a post office two miles east of Yoder at Mt. Liberty (3 February 1873 to 31 July 1886) which was later moved into the Yoder home.

Two other Amish men came to the Yoder area in 1874. Ezra T. Peachey, from Pennsylvania, moved onto a homestead claim one mile south of Yoder. After a few years, he gave up and moved to Colorado. John Nafziger, a nephew of Eli M. Yoder, came that year and worked for his uncle. He married Mrs. Yoder's sister, Emma Young, and they bought a farm one-half mile south of Yoder. He also left the Amish faith.

The Amish settlement near Yoder finally got its start in September of 1883 when the Christian Millers and the Henry Millers came to the Partridge area from Shelbyville, III. They didn't like the land near Partridge, so the land agent took them to Yoder where they found land more to their liking.

In 1884, eight Amish families arrived in Yoder from LaGrange County, Indiana. By 1899, there were so many Amish families in the Yoder area that they could not meet in a single home for their church services. A new church district was formed. By 1918, there were four Old Order Amish church districts.

In 1919, there was a branching off to form the Yoder Mennonite Church, an Old Mennonite branch. Those who formed the new branch wanted to use the automobile and other modern conveniences as they became available.

There are now two other Old Mennonite branches in Reno County—South Hutchinson Mennonite and Faith Mennonite, also of South Hutchinson.

The 1919 split was the only branching off from the Old Order for religious differences; however, in 1943, when the Navy Air Base was installed, many Amish families were displaced and most went back to Illinois and Indiana.


Today there are about 65 Old Order Amish families in the Yoder area divided into two church groups. The blacktop road running east and west through the town of Yoder is the dividing line. Each district has its own bishop.

The horse and buggy are still very much in evidence near Yoder, and the homes continue to be illumined by kerosene lamps and gas lanterns. Life goes on in the Old Order settlement near Yoder at a leisurely pace.



#### 1902


### PLAT OF

## Mormon Church seminar held in April

A seminar held by the Hutchinson Mormon Church on April 12 was designed to help genealogical researchers use the resources available from the Genealogical Library in Salt Lake

The first of four sessions dealt with the International Genealogical Index (IGI) microfiche, listing the names of more than 82 million deceased persons from many countries and time periods. The IGI lists names of parents or spouse and dates and locations of births, christenings and marriages.

The second workshop featured the Genealogical Library Catalog (GLC), which is produced by computer and printed on microfiche. It is divided into four sections: author-title, locality, surname and

subject.

The third session was on the Family Registry, a service offered by the main library to help researchers locate others who may be doing research on the same ancestor. In February 1985 the registry contained more than 85,000 names; of those, more than 65,000 were not members of the Mormon Church. The index increases by at least 1,000 names per week and is updated quarterly.

The fourth workshop acquainted participants with the Soundex and Accelerated Indexing Systems (AIS) which aid in finding the locality in which an

ancestor lived and simply census searches.

In the two years since the local church started ordering microfilms from the Genealogical Library in Salt Lake City for individual researchers, more than 500 films have been ordered for three-week or sixmonth periods, covering federal and state census; English, Norwegian and Irish census; parish and vital records from Ireland, France, Canada, England, and Norway; and church, probate, naturalization, and military records from many states.

The Mormon Church is located at 18 17th Crestview (one block east, one block north, and 1/2block east of the 17th and Severance intersection.
