Jerome was half-brother of Aaron and also a cousin. Half-brother on the maternal side and cousin on paternal side.


I hope I will hear from someone. I have your address from the Handy Book, so I hope the address is still correct.

NEWSPAPER PRESERVATION ALLIANCE

The bad news is that the state historical society is finding it necessary to dispose of their renowned newspaper collection.

The good news is that Hutchinson will, from all indications, become the repository for the Reno County papers. Yes, ALL the county papers. Or, at least all those now in the possession of the state society, which amounts to some 1500 cubic feet of them.

The Hutchinson Newspaper Preservation Alliance was born early this year with the intent of obtaining and creating an index for these old papers, and was initially composed of five persons: Pam Stansel of the genealogical society, Michael Knect of the historical society, Reta Graber from the public library, Bob Mann, representing the Hutchinson Landmarks Commission, and myself. (The landmarks commission actually fathered the organization of the NPA.)

The five of us met for the first time in February at city hall, and I must confess that there was much trepidation and many questions. But also, at least for myself, there was a dream of creating an index that uncounted genealogists, benefit historians and other researchers for all time. I knew it could be done, for I had developed one on a much smaller scale. The newspapers volume of considered, however, boggled the mind. Still, we met. And we met a second time in May, and yet a third in June.

Our fourth meeting, held in July, included Roger Verdon and Duane Schrag of the HUTCHINSON NEWS, and Leroy Gattin, the head of the public library.

Those of you, dear readers, who may be shaking your heads at the absurdity of all this - for yes, we are ants climbing Mount Everest - may be surprised at our progress.

Larry Cole has graciously given us storage space in a building he owns. The Dillon Companies have agreed to let us use one of the company's large trucks to transport the papers from Topeka to Hutchinson. The HUTCHINSON NEWS and the library have joined to create a fund to

purchase filing cabinets, folders and other items. The library has given us space in which to work and may even be able to supply a computer.

My original thought, and the plan I proposed to the other members of the NPA, was to develop a computer index based on clippings from the papers. And this is still a possibility. A plan has been formulated whereby volunteer readers would fill out forms for each issue read. Both the papers and forms would then go to a clipper who might also find relevant material, would fill out a form for this, and then clip the designated items giving preference to those with photographs. A photo-copier would serve to save any items printed back to back.

A typist would then enter the headline of the clipping and highlights from it, into the computer. This method, more refined, would give Reno Countians a most acceptable index. The clippings would, of course, be filed in cabinets, although one could just as easily find the story on microfilm once the date of the paper was known.

But there appears to be a better way.

The HUTCHINSON NEWS has been investigating scanners for some time with the thought of purchasing one for their own use. Scanners are available in two forms: a flat bed and a hand-held. With these the text can be read and the information fed directly into a computer. The computer discs familiar to you and me hold a miniscule amount of material compared to some now available. Several years of newsprint can be stored on the larger discs. If this method proves successful only photos will be clipped and filed.

Imagine being able to enter "Maude M. Smith" into a computer someday and finding not only the date of Aunt Maude's obituary, but also the date of any other newsworthy item on her. One might find that dear Maude operated one of Reno County's more infamous houses of ill repute. Or was arrested after a drunken brawl. Oh my!

If the number of newspapers boggles the mind, so should the fact that all the information in that newsprint will someday be available at the touch of the fingers.

The applications for an index such as this are limitless. Consider that if it were available now, the city could easily find all the forty or fifty-year-old stories dealing with the now controversial Obee dump site.

Obviously, you and I won't be able to use this fabulous storehouse of information tomorrow. It will undoubtedly be years before the project is completed, although it may be usable before that time.

As you've read along here, I'm certain you've noticed the word "volunteer" once or twice. The ultimate success of this project WILL depend on people.

The NPS is optimisite that we can count on each of you.

Are you starting to search for your ancestors in a new area? Have you checked to see if the RCGS exchanges a quarterly with a genealogical society in that area? Sources: The Genealogical Helper, July/August issue and RCGS Charter Issue Nov. 1989, page 11.

Family Group Sheet Exchange

A group sheet exchange is being offered by Charlotte Eaton, P.O. Box 1745, Mineral Wells, TX 76067-1745, but this service is limited to families connected to Arkansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, Tennessee or Texas by birth or death. The husband and/or wife on each sheet must have been born - before 1900 - or died in one of these five states. The charge for this service is at least one family sheet, plus a long self addressed, stamped envelope. If there are family sheets on file, the charge is \$2.00 per surname. You will be told how many sheets available on each surname.

HISTORY OF RENO TOWNSHIP by Paula Nelson

When the County was first organized it was put under one township called Reno Township. Little by little the territory was sliced off. A few of these cases were made for convenience, such as for election purposes. What is left of Reno township now is very irregular in shape, it lays partly on the north side and partly on the south side of the Arkansas River. Its overall shape is very irregular.

The first election in the township was held shortly after the first county election. Peter Shafer was the first trustee elected. He lived up on the Cow Creek, which is now in Grant township. Miller was the townships treasurer. S.N. Parker was the townships lst clerk. J. Rhoades and D.D. Olmstead were the first Justice of the Peace in both township and in the county. John McMurry and J. Brown were the first Constables. They were elected to office April 16, 1872.

The first lawsuit was April 23, 1872. The case of action was to recover a gray pony, valued at \$35.00. This case involved Lewis Josephine, plaintiff vs. Jacob Eisenbarger. The result of the case was not recorded. Mr. Eisenbarger had the further distinction of starting the 1st graveyard in the county. He accidentally killed a man called "Mountain Jack".

Valley township was the first to be cut off of Reno township, the election was supposed to have been December 7, 1872, but a prairie fire stopped it until January 8, 1873.

Four others were cut from Reno shortly after Valley, they are Little River, Haven, Castleton, and Center. These townships had filed for petition on the same day May 14, 1874. Lincoln township on November 11, 1873.

Nickerson (Grant) was cut April 28, 1872. (It was named for H.R. Nickerson of the Santa Fe railroad.) The name was changed to Grant by a petition on May 20, 1873. In early 1874 the balance of the county was districted off into townships and petitioned for organization March 24, 1874 Langdon, Medford, Salt Creek, and Troy. These were petitioned off one at a time. Langdon being the last of the four to be cut from the original township.

These 12 townships cut from the original township of Reno made 13 townships. This was then the first Sub-division of Reno county. All present townships, other than the original 13 townships into which all of the land of Reno county was originally cut, has been taken from the territory of those 13 original townships.

The main reasons most townships were created was: 1. For convenience of the citizens, which gave them a more convenient place to vote. 2. The roads in these large townships could not be properly maintained, as in a smaller more compact place. 3. At assessing time it was almost impossible for one man to cover the large territory as it became more populated.





WESIMINSTER TOWNSHIP

- (1) Westminister is named for the famous Westminister area of London, England. This area is more commonly known for the Abbey that bears the same name. The origin of the name was Western Monaster", then changed to Westmunster and finally to Westminister. Here in Kansas it became the name of a place near Hutchinson, where it is now the name of a township.
- (2) Westminister Township was formed in 1874 from part of Center Township. In 1879 Plevna township was formed from Westminister township.
- (3) The largest town in the township of Westminister is Abbyville. Abbyville was originally just a station by the name of Nonpariel. In 1910, it was reported to have 300 people.
- (4) Abbyville was named for the first baby that was born in the town, Abbey McLean.
- (5) Abbyville was originally spelled Abbeyville. This city is located on the Kinsley branch of the Santa Fe Railroad, west of Partridge. It was incorporated as a city of the 3rd class on April 6, 1888. The name change took place June 1, 1866.

founded by Emerson Willowbrook was He didn't intend to establish a Carev. city - all he wanted to do was find a new site for the Hutchinson Country Club, when he took an option on land owned by Mr. Dukelow northwest of Hutchinson. Several other directors disagreed with his choice and took an option on land owned by Mr. Levi Rayl. When the final decision for the new site of the Hutchinson Country Club was reached. Mr. Carey's location was not chosen.

Emerson Carey purchased the land he had taken an option on and at the urging of his sons decided to build a one-story version of his home in Hutchinson. The house was built in 1921 with the idea that a second story could be added, if Mr. Carey liked living outside the city limits of Hutchinson. The second home in Willowbrook was built for Howard Carey.

Landscape architects were hired to draw up plans for gardens, trees, and the swimming pool. Perry Maxwell of Oklahoma City, OK laid out the nine hole golf course. Mr. Maxwell plotted the Prairie Dunes Golf Course at a later date. Many of the flower beds and trees have been replaced by lawns and buildings as the years have passed.

Island Park

Eighty acres south of Emerson Carey's estate were plotted and landscaped for building sites. All of the homes would face a park. Behind the homes was a nine hole golf course that connected with the Carey golf course to give players 18 holes to play. He named his building development "Island Park".

The first homes in Island Park were built by Jim Lee Dick, Dr. Starrett, William Carey, Emerson Carey Jr. Arthur Carey, Emerson's brother, built a home near the outside road to Island Park.

Island Park was separated from Willowbrook when William Carey, June (Emerson Jr.) Carey, Charles Carey, Steve Horrell, Jim Dick, Dr. Starrett, Walt Boehm, and Gene Beardslee bought the area from Emerson Carey.

Third Class City

In 1952, Willowbrook and Island Park were incorporated as one city. Willowbrook was now a third class city.

Willowbrook has a Mayor and City Council form of government. There are no schools or commercial buildings (nor will there ever be). Fire protection is provided by the county with the big wells in the area supplying water for fire equipment. Willowbrook has always had electricity and a sewer system. In 1930, a city gas system was installed and updated in 1963. Each home has its own water wells the fairways and greens have an underground sprinkling system.

Flood Control

At the time that flood control dikes were planned for Hutchinson plans included for flood protection Willowbrook. Cow Creek was straightened and a large dike was built to completely Willowbrook surround in 1953. necessitated shortening the golf course to nine holes, six on the Island Park side and three on the Willowbrook side.

There are two Missouri resources, of which, researchers can take advantage without leaving the comfort of home (or at least one's hometown): The State Historical Society of Missouri's newspapers and the Missouri State Archive's microfilms of Missouri county records. Historical Society of Missouri, 1020 Lowry Street, Columbia, Missouri 65201 (located in a wing of the Ellis Library, University of Missouri at Columbia) will loan it's excellent microfilm copies of collection of Missouri newspapers through the interlibrary loan system. The key to the collection is their "A Catalog of Microfilm", Newspapers Missouri on available from the Society for \$10.00.

Although they don't make their microfilms available on interlibrary loan, the Missouri State Archives, P.O. Box 778, Jefferson City, MO 65102, does sell microfilmed copies of county records for a very reasonable \$5.00 per roll. Researchers can determine the exact reel or reels in which they are interested by using a microfilm entitled, "A Roll by Roll Listing of County Records on Microfilm, available from the Archives.

The Archives, also, furnish a limited research service in indexed records, provided that the request is made using one their forms and it is properly Types of records which can be searched include: Marriage, Deed (Grantor or Grantee), Will, Birth (1883-1893), Death Circuit Court, (1883-1893), (specify Letter of Administration, Inverntory, Appraisement, Final Settlement) French-Spanish Land Grant, U.S. Land Sales, Federal Census, (1818-1893), History, or Cemetery. Only one request at a time and each request must be accompanied by a legal-size SASE.
