The Reno County Genealogical Socitey of Hutchinson, Kansas, was founded in 1978 for the purpose of fostering genealogical research, promoting the exchange of information and encouraging the deposit of genealogical and historical materials in established libraries and archives.

Membership in the Reno County Genealogical Society is open to anyone interested in genealogy. Dues are \$10 per year per family, as of 1 April of the current year to 31 March of the following year.

Meetings are held on the third Monday of each month (except December) in the auditorium of the Hutchinson Public Library, Ninth and Main, 7-9 p.m.

### MORMON RESEARCH WORKSHOP

There is a workshop being planned for those who wish to learn more about the holdings of the Family History Library in Salt Lake City & the Family History Center in Hutchinson.

The first session will be an overview of the research that can be done in the FHC & FHL. At the second session, you will be given a chance to use the microfilm and microfiche readers to search for your family. The computer will also be used to search the Social Security Death Index, Ancestral File and IGI.

# **BITS N' PIECES**

Typed envelopes will arrive at their destination one day earlier than hand written ones. Major post offices use an optical scanner to read the addresses. The scanner reads from the bottom to the top, reading the Zip Code first. An "Attn." at the bottom can kick out the letter until it is manually sorted. Using the Zip Code (plus 4) will decrease delivery one day. (From the Golden Roots of the Mother Lode Vol. 12 No.1.)

Sending money by mail. In sending requests for information by mail it is important to make it as easy and quick as possible for the recipient to send an answer. When a personal check is sent, it must usually clear the bank before a reply is sent. Consider sending money orders instead. Many places now require it. (From the Golden Roots of the Mother Lode Vol. 12 No. 1.)

If you know the town and state but not the street address, a letter addressed leaving room for the street and number or box number, enclosed in an envelope addressed to the Post Master with a couple of dollars, will be delivered and you will be sent the address along with a receipt for the money. (From the Golden Roots of the Mother Lode Vol. 12 No. 1.)

### GEOGRAPHIC PLACE NAMES

If in your research you find the name of a town that you cannot locate on a map (like Langdon PA or Marysburg MN) what can you do to locate the town and the (continued)

county where it used to be? You can write to the following government agency: United States Board on Geographic States United Names. Survey, Geological National Center, Reston, VA 22092. This agency will locate the town for you, send a detailed description of its past location, a history of the name, a plat map showing it and a list of addresses of organizations that may be of help in your research--all at no cost. ### NEW ENGLISH RESEARCH OUTLINE

The British reference staff at the Family History Library Salt Lake City have produced a 52-page new Research Outline for England. This is an essential update that will be useful for all English researchers. There is table of contents, an introduction, and research with strategies suggestions. Α record selection table has been included, as well as maps of the counties before and after the 1974 changes. (Cont.)

There is an extensive range of records covered in detail, and each record type also shows the relevant library catalog listing. There is also a list of other records not included in the Outline and a bibliography, plus an index.

A copy of the English Research Outline can be found in the notebook holding the United States Research Outlines or if you want your own copy there are extras in the Family History Center library.

International Reply Coupons (IRCs) are now 95 cents in the US. They may be purchased from the main post office in Hutchinson and in other large cities.

### ONTARIO VITAL RECORDS OPENED

The Office of the Registrar General of Ontario transferred early birth, marriage and death records to the Archives of Ontario last August 29, 1991. The registrations included in this transfer are: births (1869-1895); marriages (1869-1910), and deaths 1869-1920).

Other related historical vital statistics were also transferred. Subsequent transfers of later registrations will occur annually according to formal records schedules. Vital records dated later than those above are still obtainable from the Office of Registrar General, P.O. Box 4600, Thunder Bay, Ontario P7B 6L8.

The Archives of Ontario is located at 77 Grenville Street, Toronto, Ontario M7A 2R9. There are gaps in these early registrations due to failure to register, especially between 1869 and the late 1890's.

The genealogical Society of Utah is microfilming these vital records and they should be available at the Family History Library later this year (1992).
