William Arthur Graves, 88, died March 16, 1993 at The Woodlands, Texas where he and his wife, Doris, had lived for the past few years. They had moved to Texas to be near their son, Jim.

Arthur or Art as he was affectionately called was a charter member of the Reno County Genealogical Society. He, along with his co-chairman, Everett Wells, headed up the work force that walked through and recorded the records of all the cemeteries in Reno County. They kept the spirits of those who were recording the tombstones during the hot summer days, fighting off the mosquitoes and bugs as they tramped through cemeteries - some unkempt and tall with grass. As a result of their diligent, dedicated and tireless labor RCGS published the Cemetery Records of Reno County Kansas, 1865-1978, a much used and appreciated book by researchers.

Art and Doris often had picnics at their home to the delight of everyone involved. Doris preceded Art in death by just one year and one day.

Art will be missed by all who worked with him and remembered for all his contributions to Reno County Genealogical Society.

German family seeks soldier from Kansas

Dear Sir:

Please help me by publishing the following in your publication.

Recently, I traveled to Germany and stayed in a small German hotel in Kaiserslautern. While there, I had the occasion to talk to a German lady at that hotel. She asked me many questions about Kansas and finally about Wichita. When I asked why she was interested, she told me the following story:

This lady, Iris, was a small child during the second World War. Her family had a farm outside Heidelberg. Her family name was Kennerknecht. As the war moved into Germany, their farm and home were bombed three times.

The German army had taken what food everyone had and as there was no place to buy food, they often went hungry. They made the acquaintance of an American soldier by the name of Donald Eugene Story. He told them he had been raised on a small farm in Kansas and that he and wife, Anestine, lived in Wichita, Kansas. He would come by their farm to visit them and he would

bring food to them as well. They grew to be very fond of this soldier. When their farm was bombed the third time, they had to move in to Heidelberg to their grandmother's home. Shortly after they were forced to move to another town. During this time they lost contact with Mr. Story. They felt as if they had lost one of their own family. At family gatherings they always talk about him and wish they could see him again. They have tried over the years to find him with no luck.

I offered to try to help her locate this man. If Mr. Story sees this letter, please contact me. Or if anyone has any information about Mr. Story or his wife, please contact me, Dana L. Dippel, P.O. Box 232, Savanna, IL 61074 or call me at (815) 273-3200. Mr. Story should be approximately 67 years of age and his wife would be approximately 65.

Any information would be gratefully appreciated.

I am not a writer of detailed stories, but I would like to share with you an interesting experience. I have enclosed an article I found in the last "ACTIVE AGING" paper we received. This paper is published in Wichita, Kansas at Friends University. After some phone calls and an inquisitive drive, I found the gentleman, the German family have been looking for so many, many years. I had such a satisfied feeling when the last call was made. Read the article and I will attempt to explain.

The phone book showed several last names of STORY. After looking in our cross-city directory, I found DONALD EUGENE STORY, I called their home several times during the day. Finally, I started down the phone book of STORY's and located a son and daughter-in-law. I talked with their son and found his father was

wintering in Texas, I placed a call to the Trailer Park, left a message for them to call me collect. I was delighted to hear from them within the hour. Relating the article to them, he said "Yes, Yes, that's right." They asked to come visit us when they return to Hutchinson, Apr 1. I said, "great", and I would be mailing the article and information to him that day. I then placed a call to Dana DIPPEL and gave her the information by phone, and said I would also send them (the Story"s) a copy of the article and addresses of the family.

Dana is a teacher with the U. S. Army. She instructs handling and transportation of hazardous materials. She too, wants to visit us, and she was callin Iris in Germany. I, too, wrote Iris Roeter in Germany. Now I'm just waiting to see and hear.

JUNE MEETING

The date, time and content of the June General Meeting of the Reno County Genealogical Society has been changed. The meeting will be held at 1:00 P.M. June 6 in the auditorium of the Hutchinson Public Library featuring Dr. Ed Brandt as the speaker. There will be no business meeting.

Dr. Edward R. Brandt, is an accredited genealogist, specializing in German research, particularly the Germans from Eastern Europe, and a co-author of the "Research Guide to German-American Genealogy" and vice-president of the recently founded Federation of East European Family History Societies.

A native of Haskell County, Kansas, Dr. Brandt has traced the history of the almost defunct Mennonite community northwest of Satanta, where he was born, to Nebraska, Ukraine, Poland and the Low Countries, as well as the subsequent emigration of most of its members to Canada (and in his grandfather's case, to Mexico).

Dr. Brandt will deliver two lectures. The first will begin promptly at 1:15 P.M. The subject of this lecture will be "An Overview of German Migration to Eastern Europe". After a short break, the second lecture titled "New Genealogical Sources in Eastern Europe" will be given.

There will be time for a question and answer period after the lectures. It has been suggested that written questions would allow time for more discussion. Please use legible handwriting or type your questions. Keep them short and to the point. Dr. Brandt is prepared to talk about research in Poland, Hungary, Netherlands, the Austro-Hungarian Empire and Czechoslovakian research.

Attendance will be limited to the capacity of the HPL Auditorium. The HPL opens at 1:00 P.M. and we must be out by 5:00 P.M.

If you find your ancestor on a Missouri tax list with livestock, etc., but no land, he may have purchased his land from the U.S. Government within the five years proceeding that tax list. If he is paying taxes on land, you know he has been there longer than five years, or bought it from a private individual.

DID YOU KNOW

KANSAS SOCIETY of the SONS of the AMERICAN REVOLUTION MICROFILMING PROJECT

The first viewing of the KSSSAR applications microfilm was at the Board of Governors' Meeting 6 Febuary 1993 in Lawrence, KS.

Included in this project: the almost 2,00 membership applications since 1892; supplement applications; and appropriate index to introduce each roll; copies of *The Liberty Bell* publication.

The original records will become the property of the Kansas Historical Society. The original records and the microfilm are not to be reproduced or used for profitmaking purposes, but only for genealogical and historical use.

It's estimated that the complete set will include seven or eight rolls of microfilm.

The Kansas Society will donate a set to the NSSAR Library in Louisville, KY.

The Sons of the Plains SAR Chapter (Hutchinson) have purchased a set of the KSSSAR applications microfilm for the Hutchinson Public Library.

(Editor's Note: The microfilms will be a great asset to genealogists researching in the HPL. I want to thank the members of the Sons of the Plains chapter for this generous donation. I'm sure that Chapter President Ed Grover and other members, who are also members of the RCGS were instrumental in securing this gift for the HPL. Ed Grover was recently in-stalled as Vice-President of the Kansas Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.)

A FATAL SHOOTING AFFRAY

Last Thursday Abraham Kelly, brother of Hon. John Kelly, of this county, shot and killed a man named Black, on Turkey creek, in Pratt county. These parties occupy adjoining claims and there has been a dispute between them in regard to the ownership of a house, Black claiming, according to the stepping of the lines, that the house was on his quarter, and Kelly that it was on his according to the field notes, which he Kelly, has. this exception the parties have been on amicable terms. Mr. Kelly was postmaster and Black his deputy in his absence. About two weeks since they had a conversation in which Mr. Kelly expressed a determination to sell his farm, and asked Black if he would raise any difficulty about possession of the house. Black told him there would be no difficulty about it, that he would give up all claims to it. Mr. Kelley came to Wichita, and a few days after returned, in company with three gentlemen, who were going to buy the Upon their arrival Black refused place. to give possession and ordered the parties out, threatening to assault Mr. Kelley. calling him abusive names, and at the same time approaching in a threatening manner close up to Mr. Kelly, when the latter drew his revolver and shot him twice in the head. Black died five hours after-Mr. Kelly came to Wichita last Saturday, and surrendered himself to the sherriff of this county. Pratt county being attached to Reno for Judicial . purposes, he will be tried at Hutchinson. The sherriff of that county came down last night to arrest him. Two men, representing themselves to be constables of Barbor county, came here and demanded the prisoner on a writ issued by a justice of the peace of Barbour, but Sheriff Dunning refused to deliver him up. holding him by authority of a telegram from Reno county. Black leaves a family to mourn his : untimely death. So far as we know Mr. Kelly he is a quiet unobtrusive and inoffensive man, and probably the last man that would take the life of a fellow being except under the imminent fear of his own The sheriff of Reno, with his prisoner left this morning for Hutchinson. KANSAS BIRTH CERTIFICATES

The following items are copied from Ancestors Unlimited

The Kansas Dept. of Health and Environment has started rejecting applications for birth certificates that do not have the appropriate fee. The Dept. increased the birth certificate fee to \$10.00 for the first copy of the birth record on Sep 15, 1992. Additional copies of the same birth record, ordered at the same time, will cost \$5.00. The increased fee will be for certified copies of birth records only. The fee for certified copies of death, marriage, and divorce records will remain \$7.00 for the first copy and \$4.00 for each additional copy of the same record ordered at the same time. A bill has been presented for the Governor's signature to raise the cost of all certificates to \$10.00 and \$5.00 as stated above.

OTHER VITAL RECORDS--

California: Birth--\$11, Death--\$7, Marriage--\$12. Certificates have increased \$1. If the correct amount of money is sent, the VR Office in Sacramento will search a ten-year period. Records are closed for people who visit the office and wish to browse through the files.

Ohio: Before September 1949 marriage certificates were not available. To get proof of marriage, write to the Probate Judge in the county where the license was issued.

Mississippi: Fee increases are as follows: Birth up from \$11 to \$12; Birth (short) up from \$5 to \$7, Death up from \$5 to \$10, and Marriage up from \$5 to \$10.

Texas: The Bureau of Vital Statistics has increased fees to \$11 for issuing each certified copy of a birth certificate, including wallet-sized, or for a search thereof; \$9 for issueing a certified copy of a death certificate or a search thereof. The fee for each additional copy of the same certificate requested at the same time is \$3.

From: Treasure State Line PROTECTING FAMILY HEIRLOOMS--Identify and label each of your family heirlooms. Select your item and give it a number. Write the number on a label and attach it in an inconspicuous place on the heirloom. On a 3 x 5 card, write the same number and a description of the heirloom, including dates, where you got it, the history of the item, and perhaps to whom you wish to leave it. Include the monetary value if known. Place this card along with a photo of the item, if possible, in an heirloom file box. Be sure that someone in the family is aware that your file box exists and where it can be found.

From: Orange Co., CA Gen. Soc. INHERITANCE LAWS - Prior to 1786, a will in VA did not have to name the wife or eldest son. A widow received her 1/3 and the eldest son received remaining 2/3, unless otherwise specified in the father; s will. Eldest son also received his mother's share if she died. If the eldest son had died, eldest grandson of the whole blood became the heir-in-law, not the second son. If the man were unmarried, his heir-in-law was his eldest brother, never his father or uncle.

In New England, the eldest son received a double portion of the estate, it was called his birthright. If you should find a person has conveyed a 1/7 interest in the father's estate, you may conclude there were six surviving children, each of whom received a 1/7 of the estate except for the eldest son, who received a 2/7 or double portion. This inheritance of real estate was set by law, the will would list other items.





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Stories should not have been published before and contain no more than 4 pages, double spaced and if possible, typewritten. Try to make your work as neat as possible - this helps keep errors to a minimum when edited. Please limit your entries to four (4) (stories/family histories).

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- 1. Names and birth dates, of course. (and don't forget the maiden names of the wives), marriage dates and places. A wedding experience - old fashloned Charivori (Chivaree).
- 2. Where did the family come from?
- 3. Date they came to Kansas - where they lived - occupations. Were they in the military, farmers, professional, etc.
- 4. Anything unusual or different about their lives.
- 5. Interesting experiences your ancestors might have had.
- 6. Physical descriptions, if known.
- 7. Dates of death and burial places. Sometimes an unusual cause of death, burial place or circumstances can make an interesting story.
- 8. Did the family members stay or move away? - Where?
- 9. Marriages of the children - spouse names etc, occupations.

Stories submitted, if selected, will be published by Topeka Genealogical Society and copyrighted. All stories become the property of the society and we reserve the right to edit the material and use as is appropriate. Only the author of the material submitted may, upon request, be granted permission to use any of the material they submitted.

It is requested by the Kansas Pioneers II Book Committee, that persons submitting stories for publication by TGS complete and submit the following release form with the manuscript: If you have already submitted material without the release, please complete the form and send it.

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It is my understanding that the material submitted will be used in a published book at a later date. It is further understood that the material submitted can be used by me should I decide to publish at a later date.

I, therefore, give permission to the TOPEKA GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY to use my material for their publication as they see fit, allowing the material to be edited as necessary.
