1925 EARLY DAYS IN KANSAS

Kansas Day was celebrated by students of Liberty Junior High School by a series of interviews with old citizens of Hutchinson on the subject of events in pioneer history.

The following stories are some of those submitted:

IN KANSAS, 46 YEARS

An interview with A. W. McCandless, president of the board of education, and Hutchinson pioneer, written by Janet Scheble, 8-A class, Liberty Junior High School.

"I came to Kansas forty-six years ago," said Mr. McCandless. "That was in 1879. I came from Illinois to Emporia in a covered wagon, from Emporia on to Hutchinson on horseback. Of course, then there were no roads, only paths or trails we had to follow."

In those days if anybody had seen an automobile he probably would have run.

It was one afternoon rather late that I came to two trails, one leading south and the other west. I didn't know which one to take. Of course, I took the wrong one-that's just my luck. It was dark when I came to the end of the trail. I happened to look down in a little valley and I saw a small hut.

I went to the door and knocked. A young girl of about twenty-three came to the door. I asked if I might stay all night. The girl said she would be glad to keep me, but they only had one room.

They found room for me and I stayed all night. We sat up and talked till midnight.

The next morning when I left, I wanted to pay them,

but they would not let me. They said my visit meant more to them than any money could.

I suppose they finally got so homesick they went back to their old home. I intended to keep track of them but didn't.

KANSAS RATTLESNAKES

An interview with C. Howard, a pioneer of Hutchinson, written by Leana Mosser, of 8-S class, Liberty Junior High School.

Mr. and Mrs. C. Howard settled in Russell county in 1877.

The first day that they were here Mr. Howard was bitten by a rattlesnake. It proved to be a very serious bite, for he nearly died from it.

"There were lots of antelope. They came in great herds of twenty-five and thirty. People ate the antelope for meat. Most people lived in dugouts. There were rattlesnakes everywhere. He killed one hundred seventy-three in the first summer. After people plowed there were just a few snakes left."

IN GRASSHOPPER DAYS

An interview with Mrs. L. C. Putt, a pioneer settler at Partridge, written by her niece, Mildred Dillman, 8-A Liberty Junior High School.

"Mrs. L. C. Putt tells about the fall of 1875 when the grasshoppers started to invade the state of Kansas. She lived at Reno Center which is now Partridge. When the grasshoppers started to light, Mr. and Mrs. Putt went out to try to save the crops. While she was working the grasshoppers ate her sunbonnet off of her head."

"The grasshoppers ate everything that was green except sweet potato vines. There were holes eaten in clothesliines posts and the houses and barns. They also ate holes in the ground and laid their eggs."

"That winter there came a big blizzard and froze the eggs, so many didn't hatch the next spring."

"The grasshoppers ate the mosquito bar off of the windows which served as screens."

REDSKINS IN KANSAS

An interview with W. L. Curtis, for 62 years, a resident of Kansas, written by Donald Hutchinson, 8-A class, Liberty Junior High School.

"I came to Kansas in the spring of 1863 in an ox-cart which was drawn by two oxen," said Mr. Curtis.

"Did you have many Indian fights after you arrived?"

Mr. Curtis answered with a smile, "I only had one

fight. One day in June I was fishing on the Pawnee Creek near Pawnee Rock when about 30 Indians who had sneaked up on the other side of the creek, started to shoot at me with their bows and arrows. I had my rifle with me. I shot at the Indians six times. Five Indians fell dead. The rest ran away. I was never bothered with Indians again."

DEAD WOMAN'S CANON (CANYON)

As the story was told by C. M. Robinson, to his daughter, Elizabeth Robinson, 8-A class, Liberty Junior High School.

"In Barber county, Kansas, there is a deep rock canon (sic) called 'Dead Woman's Canon.' Tradition tells us that the Indians stole a boy and his sister from where the Arkansas and Little Rivers meet, or near where Wichita is now."

"After several days of travel the girl escaped from the Indians and was never heard of again. Her brother eventually escaped to civilization and told of the fate of his sister."

"In a sheltered cliff or rock in this canon lies the apparently petrified form of a woman. It is supposed that she in her efforts to again reach civilization, had passed this way and had crawled into this cave and either died from hunger or exposure. She is believed to have turned to stone, thereby giving the canon its name."

HUNGRY DAYS IN KANSAS

An interview with T. A. Weldon of 321 West Seventh, written by Lucille Paschal, 8-A class, Liberty Junior High School.

"This is a true story, which happened to my mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Weldon when they were just a young married couple living in Labette county, Kansas."

"The winter was very severe and everyone was poverty stricken. My father was sick in bed. All there was in the house to eat was cornmeal and wheat."

"Mother was looking out of the window when she noticed a deer not very far away. When she told father about it, he was so hungry for meat that he got up out of bed, took his Sharpe's rifle and went out to kill it."

"He crawled on his knees in the grass almost within shooting distance of the deer when he felt too weak to go any farther. Taking chances, he shot anyway. Although he didn't kill the deer, he could tell it was badly wounded by the way it ran."

Mother, who was looking on, hitched the oxen (for they had no horses) to the sled, picked up father and went after the deer. They tracked it by the trail of blood it had left behind for about four miles".

"As this was a large deer and there were only two of them to eat it, this furnished them with meat for the rest of the winter".

ANOTHER RATTLER STORY

As related by Tom Rayl, Reno county pioneer, to Marjorie Rayl, of 8-A class, Liberty Junior High School.

"Here is another "rattler" story told by Tom Rayl, who came to Kansas and bought a farm three and one-half miles west of Hutchinson."

One time he and his son Elige went to Kingman county in a spring wagon. At night they slept under wagon. The next morning when they awakened two rattlesnakes were in bed with them.

KANSAS IN THE 70'S

An interview with W. H. Alter, who settled in Kansas in the 70's, written by his grandson Aldrich Alter, 8-A class, Liberty Junior High School.

"I came to Kansas in 1877 and proved up a claim four and one-half miles northeast of Caldwell.

At that time Caldwell was a small town. It consisted of two stores, three hotels and I am not sure how many saloons. At that time Dodge City and Wichita were noted cowboy towns.

I had to pay 25 cents for matches where you now pay five cents. A man received \$1.00 for hauling a hundred pounds of wheat from Wichita to Caldwell, a distance of 55 miles. It was \$7.00 for a barrel of one hundred pounds of flour.

"Wichita was then the nearest railraod. I took my first load of wheat there. I carried 60 bushels in my wagon, pulled by a three mule team. I sold it after having plowed the ground, sowed the seed and threshed it, for 50 cents a bushel. It took me four days to make the trip"

"After I started out of Wellington I couldn't see the end of the string of wagons ahead or behind me, so many were going to Wichita with their wheat"

"There was only one bridge across the Arkansas river at Wichita. Everybody was in such a hurry that the wagons would get locked together and they would have to get the police to get them out. I hauled 800 bushels from the first crop I raised in 1878. Wichita claimed 4,000 inhabitants that year."

"In those days everyone in Kansas had quite a few saloons. In Caldwell they didn't have a church of any kind. In Wichita there was only one mill, which goes yet by the name it carried then, Imbodens. Often

there would be many teams waiting to dump their wheat into the freight cars or the mill."
