Dear Editor,

Throughout 1996 Iowa is celebrating 150 years of statehood. In connection with this event some Eastern Iowa cousins are organizing a Homecoming Reunion for the descendants of their early Iowa ancestors.

David and Holly Skinner Scott settled in Jackson Co., IA, in 1836, a full ten years before Iowa was admitted to the Union. They were parents of 14 children, nine of whom left descendants.

Several of David and Holly's children moved on west and several settled in Kansas. One granddaughter is believed to have married S. L. Thornton and settled near Sawyer, Kansas. Old postcards from the early 1900's, postmarked Sawyer, are signed by the following cousins: John Thornton, Will thornton, Marnie Thornton, Ella Thornton, Mrs. Jesse Cromer and Mamie Bowlds.

Another family with a Scott connection settled in Reno and Kingman Counties, KS, near Pretty Prairie in the mid 1870's. This was the family of John and Harriet Young and several of their grown children.

ITALIAN RESEARCH: After many years of quietude Italian-American genealogy has recently come to life. Over 5 million Italians have emigrated to America, with over 3.5 million arriving in this century. After Italy was unified in 1859 emigration restrictions were relaxed. However, emigration to America was slowed by the Civil War. Prior to 1876 northern Italians were brought in by padroni who recruited gangs of unskilled and unmarried laborers, which they furnished to American employers, until this practice became illegal under American law. Immigration from southern Italy and Sicily began in earnest about 1876 as part of the so-called "New Migration" and peaked in the 1920's. Most Italians, like the Irish, were crammed into the tenements of New York City, Boston, and Baltimore. Unlike other ethnic groups the Italians are unique in that about 25 percent of them later returned to their villages and remained there. An Early guide was Italian Americans: An Annotated Bibliography, published by Gale Research Company in 1978. The best recent guide is a softback by John Philip Colleta, Finding Italian Roots: the Complete Guide for Americans, 128 pages, published by Genealogical Publishing Company in 1993. Also useful is Joseph G. Fucilla, Our Italian Surnames (1949) also published by Gen. Pub. Co. as a 1993 reprint. The Italian Genealogical Society of America, P.O. Box 8571, Cranston, RI 02920, issued its first newsletter in the Fall of 1994.






