COMPUTERS AND GENEALOGICAL SOFTWARE

Are you using a genealogical software program on your computer?

Some genealogical magazines/periodicals have excellent articles explaining the advantages of certain genealogical programs and hints for using some of their features. They can be found in the periodical section of the Kansas Room.

The National Genealogical Society magazines have articles in each issue and they can be found in the Computer Interest Group (NGS/CIG) section of the magazine. In the past year, articles covering PAF, GEDCOM, Ancestral Quest, Family Tree Maker, Roots IV, The Master Genealogist, Wholly Genes (windows version of The Master Genealogist), and Family Gathering have all been reviewed. The Genealogical Helper is another magazine that gives readers a chance to discuss computer programs and how they solved problems.

The latest PAF Users Unlimited has the following articles: Most Common Questions and Problems; Using the Match/Merge Features of PAF; Installing and Setting Up an ICON for Personal Ancestral File in Windows 95; Favorite WEB Sites; Creating and Using a PAF data directory; TIPS from our Members and Questions from our Members. In the Quarterly, there is a discussion about the release of PAF version 3.0. Possibly April? When the new version, with its new file structure and newer version of GEDCOM becomes the PAF standard, most shareware and auxiliary programs will become obsolete. It is suggested that anyone having these programs take advantage of them now!

EXCERPTS FROM THE CLOTHIER CHRONICLES

Edited by Grant and Jaime Clothier & Tony Clemente

Artemus R. Clothier is the common ancestor for the Clothier family of Reno County and elsewhere. Artemus R. Clothier was born in New Ashford, Mass., Sept. 14, 1787 and was married to Miss Lucy Tyler of Silver Creek in 1809 or 1810. His second wife was Miss Lucy Sherwood of Berkshire Co., Mass., who he married in 1826, and he married his third wife, Miss Mary Montgomery Harris in 1833. He was the father of eleven or twelve children, eight were living when the Silver Creek, Mass. newspaper reported his funeral sermon, March 7, 1879. He lived his entire life in Silver Creek and was an influential member of the Community.

Chauncy Clothier was born in Chautauqa, County, New York, on December 25, 1817.

He married Priscilla Sherman in Illinois on April 30, 1836; therefore he must have left home in 1835 at the age of 17. Their first child, Nelson, was born in Cook County on April 2, 1839.

Land records for Rock County, Wisconsin Territory show that he purchased land March 4, 1841 in Lima Township. Newton Sherman, their second son, was born in Rock County on June 14, 1842.

On March 8, 1844, Chauncy and Mary Jane sold 40 acres on land in Rock County to a Mr. Ira Webb. On May 3rd of the same year, he received a land patent from the U.S. Government in adjacent Jefferson County. Records show that Samuel T. Clothier, Chauncy's older brother came to Jefferson County in 1844, and the brothers were joined a short time later by Eliza, their sister, and her husband, William Moore.

Priscilla must have died in the summer or fall of 1844, since Chauncy married Mary Jane Hall in Lima, Rock County WI on March 16, 1845. Their first child, James Byron, was born August 13, 1848.

In 1849, a quit claim deed to land in Rock County was given to Edwin Hall, Mary Jane's brother. The 1850 Federal Census lists Chauncy and Mary Jane in Iowa County, Iowa. They lived 17 years in Iowa. Ten children were born to him and Mary Jane. Nelson, Newton and their half-brother, James Byron, served in the Civil War.

In the spring of 1866, he stated that he was leaving Iowa for a warmer climate and the family moved to Bates County, MO. They lived in Bates County for eight years. Two more children were born to him and Mary Jane.

The lure of the frontier sounded one final call. A history of the Peace Creek Church of Christ published in the Sylvia, Kansas newspaper describes Chauncy's migration to Kansas:

The Peace Creek congregation of the Church of Christ had its beginning in 1874 when Chauncy Clothier (a pioneer preacher) and Geo. Ardrey, Sanford Wilhite, Henry Marshall, John Groves, Isaiah Wilhite, and J. B. Clothier and their families left their homes in western Missouri and come by wagon train to the Peace Creek area in western Reno County.

While enroute they had not been negligent to stop and hold worship service on the Lord's Day. After reaching their homesteads and building their sod houses, they met for worship in their homes until 1890 when the original meeting house was completed.

Chauncy's final 24 years were spent in the Peace Creek community. He became the owner of 640 acres of productive farm land, a respected leader in the community, and the promoter of many good works among his neighbors. He died at the age of 80 on April 3, 1898.

Chauncy had an insatiable thirst of adventure. He was in Illinois before Chicago was incorporated as a city, and in the Wisconsin Territory while hostile Indians were a constant threat to the tiny band of settlers. He was among the first settlers of Iowa County and he was in the first wave of homesteaders in western Reno County, Kansas where he endured the grasshopper plague of 1974, drought, prairie fires, and rumors of Indian raids. Only in Missouri did he settle in an established community.

He was a leader in every community where he located. He was town treasurer in Jefferson, Wisconsin, and the first Justice of the Peace in Fillmore Township, Iowa County. Upon moving to Bates County, Missouri he was once again elected Justice of the Peace of Boone Township. There is no evidence he had political ambitions; rather, his neighbors seemed to recognize his leadership qualities and trustworthy character.

Finally, he was a man of spiritual integrity and deep religious convictions. He seems to have been instrumental in establishing the Church of Christ wherever he settled.

The stories about Mary Jane (Vol. 3, No. 2) and some of the children of Chauncy and Mary Jane Clothier, can be found in "The Clothier Chronicles" newsletters that have been placed in the Hutchinson Public Library, Kansas Room by Freda Werner, a member of the Reno County Genealogical Society.

He was on the National Archives Advisory Council from 1977-1980 and was instrumental in initiating the fund, through which all genealogists could assist in providing special finding aids and indexes of special valuable in genealogical research.

Genealogists were asked to voluntarily give at least \$1.00 per year to the Fund through their local genealogical societies. (The Kansas Council of Genealogical Societies donates \$1.00 for every member society.) Read the *Kansas Review*, v. 21 #2, Oct 1995.

Since the inception of the Fund in 1983, \$41,235 has been contributed. Projects made possible through this Fund and now accessible through the National Archives Regional Branches (incuding the one in Kansas City, MO are:

- Microfiche of street indexes to 39 of the largest U. S. cities in the 1910 Census.
- Duplication of enumeration district descriptions for the 1920 U. S. Census.
- Index to War of 1812 prisoner of war records.
- Canadian border crossings, 1895-1948.
- Galveston Passenger Arrival Records, 1896-1948.

Additional projects now in the works include:

- Burial registers of Army Quartermaster General, 1828-1929.
- Card records headstone contracts and soldiers' burial, 1861-1903
- Letters received regarding impresses seamen by the Department of State, 1794-1914.

L. REYNOLDS CAHOON NAMED ASSISTANT ARCHIVIST OF THE U. S.

L. Reynolds (Ren) Cahoon has been named Assistant Archivist of the United States for Policy and Information Resource Management Services. Mr. Cahoon has been with the Family History Department of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints since 1979, his most recent position being its managing director. He is also the executive vice-president of the Genealogical Society of Utah, a member of the International Council of Archives Automation Committee and a director of the board of the Civil War Trust. He is coauthor of the book Magnetic Media Archival Recommendations.

In making the appointment, John W. Carlin, Archivist of the United States noted that Cahoon has extensive experience in strategic planning, business process redesign, information strategies and architecture, and product planning and development processes. At the Family History Department he was responsible for planning, development, and global implementation of sophisticated automated tools for genealogical research.

He also played key roles in establishing cooperative partnerships with the British government to create a computerized index to the 1881 British census and with the U.S. Department of the Interior, Federation of Genealogical Societies and the National Archives to develop an index to Civil War participants.

Before joining the Family History Department in 1979, he was controller of Inland Steel Container Company's Ohio manufacturing facility and prior to that an accountant for Sears, Roebuck and Company in its midwest regional accounting center.

Mr. Cahoon was raised in the Chicago area and holds a B.A. in management and economics.

Have you forgotten? Due to the large number of pioneers of Kansas who have been forgotten through the years, the Kansas Council has set up a program to honor these forgotten settlers. As part of this program, certificate applications are being solicited from descendants of pioneers.

TERRITORIAL CERTIFICATE—an applicant must be a direct descendant of an ancestor who lived in Kansas prior to 29 January 1861.

PIONEER CERTIFICATE—an applicant must be a direct descendant of an ancestor who lived in Kansas between 29 January 1861 and 31 December 1880.

EARLY SETTLER CERTIFICATE—an applicant must be a direct descendant of an ancestor who lived in Kansas between 1 January 1881 and 31 December 1900.
