Page 97, PASSENGER AND IMMIGRATION LISTS: If you have found your ancestor in Filby's "Passenger and Immigration List Index" you can obtain a copy of the original document Filby used for his index. The Burton Historical Collection at the Detroit Public Library, 5201 WOODWARD AV, DETROIT, MI 48202 maintains all sources. To start a search, cite the source number from Filby's Index and enclose a non-refundable check for \$10.00 payable to Detroit Library Commission. Also note that you agree to pay an additional 20 cents per page for any copies plus \$2.00 for

OHIO DEEDS: Copies of almost all deeds for land sold by the State of Ohio from 1837 to the present day are recorded in the Auditor of States's Land Office, P O Box 1140, Columbus, Ohio 43266-0040. The index is alphabetical by surname, given name, and contains about 23,000 cards. Included are deeds conveying school, ministerial, swamp, salt reservations, canal lands, and others.

Page 98, OHIO RESEARCH HELP: The Ohio State Historical Socity, 1892 Velma Avenue, Columbus, OH 43211 has the following research help: (1) Free information Packet. (2) E-mail requests for half-hour search of the following indexes: vital records, probate indexes, grantor-grantee deed indexes, census indexes and naturalization. For each search (one name in one source) the fee is \$3.00. The on-line address is: ohsref@winslo.ohio.gov. They also have Ohio newspapers for rent through your library - cost \$8. (Columbus OH Dispatch 10 Dec 1995).

OREGON DEATH CERTIFICATES: Closed for 50 years, the older ones are available through the Oregon State Archives. Copies are 25¢. Mail address is 800 Summer Street, NE, Salem OR 97310-1347 or by E-mail: archives@state.or.us. You will be billed for certificates and postage.

Page 105, BOUNTY LAND MANAGE-MENT RECORDS "America's History Meets High Technology—It's A Good Match" by Henry Ed Trippe. The Bureau of Land Management's Eastern States Office is preserving America's rich documentary heritage. More that 1.8 million homestead and cash entry patents are automated. These records, issued by the General Land Office (GLO) prior to July 1, 1908 are for the states of Alabama, Arkansas, Louisiana, Florida, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Ohio, & Wisconsin. CD-ROM's of the automated database are available for Arkansas, Louisiana, Florida, Michigan,

Minnesota, Ohio, and Wisconsin. Copies of the CD's may be purchased from the Government Printing Office, which is also making the CD's available to all Federal depository libraries, major libraries in cities, universities and colleges. BLM is also presenting each State government with copies for all its counties. GOOD IDEA — Tip of the Month

Can't find great-grandpa Sylvester's birthplace? Don't even know exactly when he was born? It's a problem. The 1900 census says one thing, the 1910 records say something else. Well, if he was a citizen, he would want to vote, and if he voted, he had to register.

Voter registration cards are available for the 19th and 20th centuries in many courthouses. The registrant had to give his birth date and the place that he was born. The election commissioners wanted to be sure he was 21 and born in this country. Or, if he was not born in this country, when and where he became naturalized. The immigrant had to give the date and location of that event, and the name of the court that authorized his citizenship. The card will also show his signature. Records are filed alphabetically or by wards.

Have the home address available if possible when you call the appropriate courthouse. A phone call could save time and expense in finding this information. Don't expect to find a widowed great-grandmother this way. Women couldn't vote until 1920. Source: St. Louis Gen Soc. March 1996.

INTERNATIONAL MAILINGS

The German Post Office's recent change in its way of handling IRCs [International Reply Coupon] is impacting genealogists greatly. The new regulations mean that only one IRC can be accepted for any letter or package, and any postal charges in excess of the value of the IRC must be paid in cash. One IRC equals 3 DM (Deutsche marks) of postage, which will cover the cost of sending about one sheet of paper and the envelope. Germans can no longer

turn IRCs in for cash. If you request information from Germany, be sure to send along enough funds to cover the return mailing expense. The easiest and least expensive way to deal with the foreign money exchange problem is to use the services of Ruesch International Monetary Services 1-800-424-2923. This agency will exchange your personal check in U.S. dollars, drawn on a U.S. bank, for a check made out to the payee of your choice in the currency of any country plus a service fee of \$3.00. Upon receipt of your personal check, the bank draft will be mailed to you.

As of 15 February 1997, the rate of exchange is £1 = \$1.63. Ruesch also has an office in London.

Family History Center Updates

An update for the Social Security Death Index and the Family History Library Catalog have just been received and installed on the computer.

Personal Ancestral File 3.0

The Personal Ancestral File 3.0 software is available from Salt Lake City for \$15.00. This price is the same whether you have used PAF before or are a first time purchaser.

Version 3.0 is very different from the old versions. The Research Data Filer has been replaced by a section called "Sources". Sources will enable you to type in the information about the source you are using whether it is a book, magazine, microform (film or fiche), or other source just once and then refer to it many times. The "Notes" section is still available and should be used for focus reports and biographical infor-

be used for focus reports and biographical information. Because the lines in notes have been changed from 79 to 77 characters in length, it is suggested that the freeware program GED-WRAP be used.

The Family History Department has sent a PAF-Software Maintenance Release (Version 3.0M) to Registered Owners and User Groups of PAF 3.0. It addresses problems identified in version 3.0 since its relaease in May 1997. It also includes some new functions and the date and relationship calculators, two popular functions in release 2.31 were restored.

New Home Computer Product

The Family History Department is releasing a new Windows product, Personal Ancestral File Companion. This software is designed to help the home user print quality genealogy charts and reports. Personal Ancestral File Companion will be used with Personal Ancestral File 3.0 and a Windows-supported printer. It has an easy-to-use Windows interface and will be available for \$10 through the Salt Lake Distribution Center some time in October 1997.

DOCUMENTATION

From the Editor:

I have tried to stress the importance of documentation whenever I have given a workshop, worked at the Hutchinson Family History Center, or wrote the guidelines for the Family History/Genealogy Awards program sponsored by the Kansas Council of Genealogical Societies. I believe the following book review that I found in another publication is an example of what I am trying to prevent. I left out the name of the family on purpose.

BOOK REVIEW

The author states in her preface and introduction that she intended her book to be a "readable and as factual as possible a story with documentation and notes kept to a minimum." Although there is a two-part bibliography and a list of where she did her research, where she found what is not made clear. There is no name or place index. As with any writing that has not been properly documented, its validity has to be questioned.

This reviewer found the book to be boring and long-winded, as well as confusing as to which generation was being discussed. Proper documentation and a more accepted numerical system would have improved its research value. However, someone researching the "——" line might find it much more interesting. Even though the information presented would have to be researched all over again to verify its accuracy, it would give the reader a place to start.

Don Phillips, chairman of the committee, presented changes the committee recommended at the October 6, 1997 Executive meeting of the Reno County Genealogical Society. A motion was made by Ruth Filbert and seconded by Pam Stansel that the changes recommended by the committee be accepted. A discussion of the many factors involved in changing the by-laws as recommended by the committee followed. The motion carried by unanimous vote.

The revisions to the current by-laws were read at the October General Meeting of the Reno County Genealogical Society and will be voted on at November General Meeting.

SUGGESTED BYLAW REVISIONS

ARTICLE IV. MEMBERSHIP AND DUES SECTION 2. The annual membership dues for the society shall be set by the executive committee subject to approval of the membership. Dues shall include both spouses of a family, dues are payable <u>January 1</u> and become delinquent <u>February 1</u> of the same year. A notice of dues will be inserted in the 4th quarterly of the year.

(Insert) ARTICLE V. FISCAL YEAR SECTION 1. The fiscal year shall begin January 1 and end December 30.

ARTICLE V shall become ARTICLE VI.

Insert the following sections in Article VI. SECTION 3. Vacancies in the offices other than president shall be filled by appointment of the president, subject to the approval of the board of directors, to fill the unexpired term. SECTION 4. All officers, committee chairpresons, upon retiring shall deliver to their successors all moneys, account records, papers or other properties of the society.

BYLAWS

Article I: Name

The name of this organization shall be the Reno County Genealogical Society of Hutchinson, Kansas.

Article II: Objects

The object of this society shall be to:

- 1. Further a popular interest in genealogy by acquiring genealogical, historical and biographical information to share with its members;
 - 2. Record and preserve genealogical records;
 - 3. Add to the genealogical and historical knowledge of its members; and to
 - Assist members in the compilation of family histories.

Article III: Policies

Section 1. The Reno County Genealogical Society is organized as a corporation not for profit under the Corporation Laws of Kansas and by its charter is dedicated to conduct its business operation under the requirements of Internal Revenue Code section 501(c)(3) as a tax exempt organization.

Section 2. The purpose of this society shall be mainly educational and shall be developed thuough guest

speakers, workshops, committees and projects.

Section 3. This society shall be noncommercial, nonsectarian and nonpartisan. No commercial enterprise and no candidate shall be endorsed by it. Neither the name of the society nor the names of its officers in their official capacities shall be used in any connection with a commercial concern or with any partisan interest or for any purpose other than the regular work of the society.

Section 4. This society may cooperate with other organizations and agencies active in genealogy and history

provided they make no committments which bind their member groups.

All genealogical, historical and biographical records acquired by the society shall remain Section 5. the property of the society. Reproduction for personal gain of said records shall require the express written permission of the society.

Section 6. Upon dissolution of the society, the board of directors shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all the liabilities of the society, dispose of all the assets of the society exclusively for the purposes of the society, in such manner, or to such organization or organizations organized and operated exclusively for charitable, educational, religious or scientific purposes as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law) as the board of directors shall determine. Any such assets not disposed of shall be disposed of by the District Court of Reno County, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization or organizations, as said court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes.

Article IV: Membership and Dues

Section 1. Any person who is interested in the objects for which this society has been formed may become a member upon payment of dues.

Section 2. The annual membership dues for this society shall be set by the executive committee subject to approval of the membership. Dues are payable on April 1 of each year (the beginning of the societies fiscal year) and become delinquent after May 1st of the same year.

Section 3. In the event of expenses incurred for special programs, speakers, workshops or projects; a special assessment may be levied or collection taken to cover said expenses.

Article V: Officers and their Election

Section 1. The officers of this organization shall be a president, a vice-president, a recording secretary, a corresponding secretary and a treasurer. The officers shall be elected by ballot at the regular meeting in February; however, if there is but one candidate for any office, by motion from the floor, the election may be by voice. Officers shall serve for a term of one year and shall remain in office until their successors are elected.

Section 2. Nominations for officers shall be made by a nominating committee of at least three members appointed by the executive committee one month prior to the election of officers. The nominating committee shall report at the election meeting the name of at least one candidate for each office to be filled. The consent of each candidate must be obtained before his name is placed in nomination. Additional nominations may be made from the floor provided the consent of each candidate has been obtained before his name is placed in nomination.

Article VI: Duties of Officers

Section 1. The president shall preside at all meetings of the society and of the executive committee; shall be a member ex officio of all committees except the nominating committee; and shall perform all other duties usually pertaining to the office.

Section 2. The vice-president shall act as aide to the president and shall perform the duties of the president in the absence of that officer.

Section 3. The recording secretary shall keep a correct record of all meetings of the society and of the executive committee.

Section 4. All monies of the society shall be received by the treasurer and kept in a bank account. The treasurer shall keep an accurate account of receipts and expenditures of the society; and shall pay out funds only as authorized by the society. A statement of account shall be presented at every meeting of

Article VI: (continued)

and at other times when required by the exerutive committee.

The treasurer's accounts shall be audited annually for the protection of the treasurer. An auditor or an auditing committee shall be appointed by the executive committee at least two weeks before the annual meeting Section 5. The corresponding secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the society.

Article VII: Meetings

Section 1. A regular meeting of this society shall be held in the third Monday of each month at 7:00 PM at the public library, unless otherwise provided by the society or by the executive committee. Five days notice shall be given of change of date. Special meetings may be called by the executive committee, five days notice having been given. At the annual meeting in March, reports shall be received and elected officers shall take office on 1 April.

Section 2. The privilege of holding office, making motions, debating and voting shall be limited to members of the society whose dues are not in arrears.

Section 3. One-third of the membership shall constitute a quorum.

Section 4. Business transacted at a regular meeting of the organization will ordinarily follow the order here given:

- 1. Call to order
- 2. Reading and approval of minutes
- 3. Statement of treasurer
- 4. Reading of communications 5. Reports and their disposal
- a. Executive committee
 - b. Standing committees

 - c. Special committees

- 6. Unfinished business
- 7. New business
- 8. Announcements
- 9. Program
- 10. Adjournment

Article VIII: Board of Directors

Section 1. The governing body of the society shall be the board of directors. The board shall be composed of the elected officers and the resident agent (as appointed by the elected officers).

Section 2. The board of directors shall have general management and control of the property and business of the society.

Section 3. Meetings of the board are called by the president and shall be called upon the request of four members of the board. Four members of the board shall constitute a quorum.

Article IX: Executive Committee

Section 1. The executive committee shall consist of the elected officers of the society, the immediate pas president, and the chairmen of the standing committees. The members of the executive committee shall serve until their successors are elected.

Section 2. The duties of the executive committee shall be (a) to transact necessary business in the intervals between society meetings and such business as may be referred to it by the society; (b) to approve the plans of work of the standing and special committees; (c) to present a report at the regular meetings of the society; (d) to appoint an auditor or an auditing committee at least two weeks before the annual meeting; (e) to prepare and submit to the society for approval a budget for the fiscal year; and (f) to approve routine bills within the limits of the budget.

Section 3. Regular meetings of the executive committee shall be held monthly, the time to be fixed by the committee at its first meeting of the year. A majority shall constitute a quorum. Special meetings of the executive committee may be called by the president or by a majority of the members of the committee.

Article X: Standing Committees

Section 1. Such standing committees shall be created by the executive committee as may be required to promote the objects and interests of this society. The chairmen of the standing committees shall be selected by the officers of the society. Their term of office shall be one year.

Section 2. The chairmen of all standing committees shall present plans of work to the executive committee and no committee work shall be undertaken without the approval of the executive committee. ship becomes vacant, the executive committee appoints a person to fill the unexpired term. When a chairman-

Section 3. The selection of members of the committee shall be determined by the chairmen of the committee. Section 4. Special committees may be appointed by the executive committee. A special committee is created for a specific purpose When its work is done and its final report is accepted or adopted, it automatically goes out of existence.

Article XI: Amendments

These bylaws may be amended at any regular meeting of the society by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting, provided notice of the proposed amendment has been given at the previous meeting.

Article XII: Rules of Order

The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall govern this society in all cases in which the are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these bylaws.

The History of Reno County

The territory now included within the limits of Reno County became part of Marion County by Legislative enactment in 1865. This fact explains why the history of Reno County schools, as told on subsequent pages of this book, begins with the first school established within the present boundaries of Marion County. It seems a far cry from the sod school house in which our first county teacher held school until the present day of splendid schools and school buildings. Borne along in the current, progress seems slow because we do not perceive the rate of movement. It is only when we turn aside for a moment to contrast past with present conditions that we recognize the distance we have traveled or the prodigious changes which have taken place along the way.

Reno County was organized in 1868, and some four years later the first school district was formed. This was district No. 1, and has since become the seat of the Hutchinson City Schools.


Prior to the organization of district No. 1, a school had been opened under the management of Miss Jennie Hodgson, whose portrait appears in the gallery of pioneer teachers as shown in another chapter of this book. For some time, Miss Hodgson's school consisted of one pupil, Olive Miller, now Mrs. Olive Ramsey, of 107 Seventh West. This school was supported by contributions from the parents, and when the school reached its maximum size, Miss Hodgson received \$20.00 per month.

In all, one hundred sixty districts have been organized, though the number has been reduced somewhat by the consolidation of districts to form a central school or by joining districts to adjacent districts. There are eighteen graded schools in the county and one hundred thirty one-teacher schools at the present time. During the school year 1916-1917, the Hutchinson school census was 5,566, the enrollment, 4,269; for the graded schools outside the city, the census was 2,396, the enrollment, 2,073; for the one-teacher schools, the census was 4,312, the enrollment, 2,887 The sum total was a census of 12,274 and an enrollment of 9,229.


The high school facilities now include the Hutchinson High School, the Reno County High School at Nickerson; nine Rural High Schools located, respectively, in the cities of Pretty Prairie, Arlington, Partridge, Langdon, Plevna, Sylvia, Abbyville, Haven, Turon; and District Hight Schools at South Hutchinson and Buhler. A movement is now under way for the organization of rural high districts in two other localities. A few years ago, high school facilities were confined to Hutchinson and Nickerson, and the total number in attendance less than half the present enrollment. It

is sometimes said that the cities are more favorable to education and particularly high least one hundred, than the number in the city. but the number of young people attending high school from the country is greater, by at County. school education than the country. First School House and School in Marion, Reno County

The Territorial Legislature, on the 17th day of February, 1880, created the County of Marion, bounded as follows, to-wit: Commencing at the southeast corner of Township 21, South, Range 5, East of the Sixth Principal Meridian, thence North to the Northeast corner of Township 18, South, Range 5, East, thence North to the Southeast corner of Dickinson County, thence West to the Sixth Principal Meridian, thence South to the Southwest corner of Township 21, South, Range 1, East, thence East to the place of beginning.

In June, 1860, William P. Shreve, George Griffith, William H. Billings, Henry Blanchard and B. F. Frazier settled at and near Marion. William P. Shreve, George Griffith and William H. Billings had their families with them, and made permanent settlements on the land they had selected. B. F. Frazier and Henry Blanchard were single men, but each took a claim.

These were the first tracts of land in Marion County to which the title passed from the Government to actual settler. They were the first actual bona fide settlers in Marion County, and were at that time the only bona fide settlers in that vast expanse of prairie wilderness. West of the East line of said county.

In the spring of 1864, before the county was organized, or a school district established, the settlers in and around Marion met and decided to build a log school house and have a school taught therein. John C. Snow, who then lived about one mile Northeast of town, on the East side of Clear Creek, had logs cut for an addition to his house, but upon request of the other settlers, loaned them the logs with which the school house was built. The school house was built on the East side of Muddy Creek, nearly opposite to where the old Waterworks building now stands; the door was located in the West end of the building, one window in the South and one in the North side. It had no wooden floor, nothing but dirt, was covered with puncheons first and then with dirt, the seats were made of split logs smoothed on the split side with a broadax, with four wooden legs, two in each end, and were without backs and had no desks to hold the pupils' books: these, with a dry goods box for a teacher's desk, were all of the inside furniture.

The patrons of the school agreed to pay the teacher a certain sum for teaching a three months' term, there being no public money to use for that purpose. Miss Rebecca A. Shreve was employed to teach the first term of school: this was the first school taught in Marion County. It had an attendance of fifteen scholars.

In June, 1864, at the time I was teaching school in the log school house which had been completed but a short time, just after school had been taken up, one of the Miller boys came running towards the school house and shouted: "Come home, quick, the Indians are coming." The children screamed and cried, and everything was in an uproar and we lost no time in running to our respective homes, where the men soon had the horses hitched to the wagons and we all started East, going as fast as the horses could travel. We went as far as Widow Shaft's, who lived near Elmdale, in Chase County, where we camped and stayed nearly a

week, but as we saw nothing of the Indians, all the families returned to Marion, but I went to Council Grove, and did not return home till about six months later, so I never finished my term of school, having taught but about nine weeks.

This house was built and the first school taught more than one year before school district No. 1 was organized or established. By an act of the Leislature of February 17th, 1865, the boundary lines of the county were extended from the Northwest corner of the county, on the township line to the West line of th State, thence South to the Southwest corner of the state, thence East on the state line to the Sixth Principal Meridian, thence North on the Meridian line to the Southwest corner of the county, and embraced all of the old county. It was 286 miles long at its longest point, and 112 miles wide at its widest point, and contained 29.088 square miles.

In June, 1865, after the county lines were re-established, Governor Samuel J. Crawford, by proclamation in accordance with the prayer of a petition signed by the citizens of said county, organized the county, and appointed county officers.

After the county was organized, School District No. 1 was established and organized, its boundaries were co-extensive with those of the county, and it became the owner of said log school house, and several terms of school were taught therein, before the new stone school house was built.

The old Santa Fe Road entered the county near its Northeast corner, and passed through it in a Southwesterly direction, intersecting the Arkansas River at or near where Ellinwood, Barton County, is now located. Along said road were scattered numerous trading posts and stage stations, and at each of the trading posts, intoxicating liquors were sold. After the organization of the county, and School District No. 1, all of the property belonging to said ranchmen, was assessed for taxation by the Marion County Assessor.

A liquor license fee was assessed against each ranch keeper who sold intoxicating liquors, by the officers of the county. The taxes on the property and the liquor license fees were collected by the proper officers, and paid into the county treasury, which practice continued until 1868, when by an act of the Legislature, the county was restored to its original size. The county lines in 1865, were extended so as to give the county the right to collect taxes and liquor license fees from those ranchmen, for, without it, they were escaping all taxation. At that time, there was not sufficient property of a taxable nature in the county, to raise sufficient funds to pay the running expenses of the county, and support a school, without enlarging the county and including those ranchmen, as was done.

The territory embraced in said School District No. 1, in 1865, is now divided into thirty-seven counties, containing in 1910, 2.383 school districts, having a school population of 121,011, employing 1,429 teachers, besides having numerous school district and county high schools. It, also, contains a large number of colleges and other educational institutions, and had in 1911, a population of 407,862.

One of the well-known pioneer teachers of Reno County was Mrs. Charlotte Sample, now past 85 years of age, a resident of Hutchinson. Mrs. Sample was born in West Hartford, Conn., afterwards moving to Ohio. She came to Hutchinson in 1374, the year following the grasshopper raid. Having received a good education in Connecticut. and having become a teacher in Ohio, she turned to teaching in Kansas. Her first school was conducted in a sod school house near Medora, at a salary of \$25.00 per month. School was held six days in the week.

School was a new thing in those days, and children gathered at the sod house seat of learning for miles around. There were few books, no blackboard, and very meager apparatus, indeed.

It is related that Mrs. Sample went from house to house, soliciting small amounts from those able and willing to contribute, in the effort to raise money to buy a dictionary. Finally, the coveted lexicon was obtained, only to be stolen a short time after its purchase by someone who entered the school without leave and carried it away.

Mrs. Sample was a very energetic and successful teacher in her day. Many of her former pupils, now mature men and women of middle life or past that period, live near Medora. These people speak of their old teacher with great respect. The memory of the old school days, though full of hardships, are still dear to them.

Mrs. Richardson had the advantage of excellent schools in laying the foundations of her education. She was graduated from the high school at Athens, Ohio, in 1856, and in 1886, she finished a four-year course and received her degree from the Springfield Female College. Referring to her work in these institutions, Mrs. Richardson recently declared in answer to an inquiry that she was a graduate of both of them, but that she had learned ten times more in the schools of Reno County than she ever learned in high school or college.





Professor E. L. Payne belongs on the list of those who have achieved distinction as well as on the record of pioneer teachers. Coming to Kansas in

who have achieved distriction as well as on the record of pioneer teachers. Coming to Kansas in 1878, he entered the profession of teaching and climbed steadily upward to the top of his profession. He taught in the district schools of Lincoln, South Reno, and Valley townships, also in South Hutchinson and Nickerson. Many of the leading professional and business men of Hutchinson and Reno County were former pupils of Mr. Payne.

Mr. Payne graduated from the Kansas State Normal in 1883, and in 1884 he was elected to the office of County Superintendent. He held this office for four years, during which period the districts assumed something like their present form. He introduced the classification register in 1886, and the following year ten students were graduated. This number has now reached 25% or more each year. Mr. Payne regards the inauguration of this system in Reno County, which led to its acceptance throughout the state as a matter of law, as his greatest chievement.

During his term as superintendent, Mr. Payne was married to Miss Lizzie Cost, of Maryland. The six children of this union are all graduates of the Kansas State Normal. The five dughters hold high positions

as teachers, and the one son is in the national army.

Mr. Payne was an instructor in the Department of
Mathematics of the Kansas State Normal for over
twenty years, twelve of which he was head of the department.



Mr. Payne has long been recognized as one of the best all-round scholars and educators in the state. The most beautiful and significant interschool event each year is the Common School Commencement, held in the Convention Hill at Hutchinson. Here the graduates are gathered from the entire county, and when scated upon the platform, the picture in a most pleasing and inspiring one, indeed. The event is so popular that a very large audience assembles in honor of the occasion. The class of 1917 contained 240 members. The class of 1918 will be the largest in the history of our schools, numbering in all 290 members.

The diploma issued to common school graduates qualifies the holder to enter the Freshman class of any high school in the state. A notable and worthy feature of our graduating exercises for the past five years has been that the program has begun at two o'clock on each occasion. At precisely two, the members of the class have started upon the platform to take the places arranged for them. It is also a notable fact that very few, often less than ten, have failed to be present and take part in the exercises. The two facts, that of promptness and almost perfect attendance, are evidence of the spirit and discipline of the young people who finish the common schools of good, old Reno County.



LENTZ HEIGHT TALBOTT FISHER WATTS

My great grandmother Sarah Anna LENTZ was born 23 Feb. 1827 in unknown county of Ohio. She died 7 July 1886 in Hutchinson, Reno County, Kansas and was supposedly buried there. She was first married to John FISHER who later died in Allen County, Ohio and then she married my great grandfather Simon Cornelius HEIGHT in Allen County, Ohio. They eventually moved to Poweshiek County, Iowa. Simon died somewhere in Iowa (I've never located his death and burial place).
