

ON THE COVER

Reno School, also known as Peace Creek, is located on 4th Avenue not too far east of the Stafford - Reno County line. It sits behind some very large trees and is easy to miss. Above the east door is a sign that reads "Standard School". Above that sign is the school district number, "72", still in tact. Another one is located on the north side of the building. Southwest of the drive an old outhouse still stands. The floors are rotted away but the 2-seater is still there.





Levi P. Hadley & Mary Jane Jessup



Levi P. Hadley, a well-known pioneer of Reno County and honored veteran of the Civil War, who is now living comfortably retired from the more active duties of life on his fine farm in Reno township, where he has made his home since 1874, is a Hoosier, a member of the famous Hadley family, well known throughout central Indiana, which has numbered among its members a judge of the supreme court of Indiana, a treasurer of state and others distinguished in the civic and social life of the old Hoosier state. He was born in Hendricks County, Indiana, not far southwest of the state capital, on February 25, 1840, son of Joab and Mary Pickett Hadley, both natives of North Carolina, of Quaker parentage, whose respective parents had settled in the Plainfield neighborhood of Hendricks County at an early day in the settlement of that sterling old Quaker community.

Levi P. Hadley was reared on the farm in Hendricks County, Indiana, receiving his elementary education in the district schools of Guilford township, that county, which he supplemented by a short course in Earlham College, at Richmond, that state. On July 28, 1861, he enlisted for service in behalf of the Union in Company E, Twenty-sixth Regiment, Indiana Volunteer Infantry, and served for three years and fifty-five days. During this service he participated for four weeks in the siege of Vicksburg and took part in the memorable Yazoo River expedition. During the battle of Prairie Grove, Arkansas, he was severely wounded in the knee. Upon the conclusion of his military service, Mr. Hadley returned to his home in Indiana and on September 12, 1865, was united in marriage to Mary Jane Jessup, who was born and reared in Hendricks County, that state, and who was generally and lovingly referred to throughout that community as "the best and bright-

est girl in the township." Mr. Hadley had inherited a tract of sixty-four acres, his portion of his deceased father's estate, and on that small farm he and his wife and their growing little family made their home until 1874, in the fall of which year they came to Kansas, settling on a tract of railroad land in Reno township, this county, where they established their permanent home and where Mr. Hadley is still living. Mr. Hadley had made a trip to this county in August of 1874, and, despite the horrid scourge of grass-hoppers which the pioneers had endured that summer, was so deeply impressed by the possibilities presented hereabout as a choice of agricultural region that he bought the north half of section 3, township 26, range 6 west, in Reno township, and immediately made arrangements

for the removal of his family to this county, and they arrived here on November 18, following.






NOT TO BE FORGOTTEN

A Headstone for Charles E. Quinn

In almost every cemetery are the unmarked graves of people, some perhaps forgotten. During the research of civil war veterans buried in Reno County, it was discovered that veteran Charles Quinn had an unmarked grave at the East-side Cemetery. Military headstones are available at no cost as long as proof of service is provided. Marilyn James, a descendent, was located in Arkansas and a copy of his pension record obtained. Gale Wall completed the application and submitted to the Veterans Affairs office. On July 26, 2006 Kathleen Dankanyin, Jim Stoecklein and Gale Wall were present for the installation of Charles Quinn's headstone. Photos were mailed to Marilyn. She hopes to visit in the fall.





John George is the father of Kathleen Cavanaugh - Dankanyin.



In the May 2006 issue of the Sunflower I submitted an article titled "Orphan Photos". While in Emporia with Karen Burgess and Ruth Filbert to attend the Kansas Council of Genealogical Societies annual conference the subject of orphan photos came up during one of our conversations. Karen told me she had an old photo with a lot of family information written on the back that she had rescued many years before at a flea market. We agreed that I would take it and see if I could locate a living descendent. The photo was the family of Robert and Annie Cheney with their infant daughter Lizzie Blanch.

After searching for a while it became obvious that Robert Cheney was a common name. I changed directions and did a Google search for Zeno Summers, the husband of Elizabeth Blanche, the infant pictured. I got a hit that led me to the web site of Ramona Summers. I sent her an email, after which we spoke on the phone. And the rest is well...history. The Photograph has been reunited with Bob Summers of Mesa Arizona, great grandson of Robert and Anna Cheney.

Karen and I received a lovely thank you card from the Summers and a donation given to the society. The experience was one not easily described with words and one we hope that will be repeated with other orphaned photos in our possession.

Hi Gale:

We are delighted with the picture you sent. Be sure to thank Karen for rescuing it and we certainly thank you for all your research to put the picture in the right hands.

The picture appears to be Bob's great grandparents, Robert Bechtel Cheney and Anna (Thornton) Cheney, with their daughter, Elizabeth Blanche Cheney. The information on the back confirms some of my previous research and fills in some of the missing data. For instance: it says that "Annie" was born in Wirt Co., West Virginia and information I had received from another Cheney, not in his line, had said she was born in Wood Co., Virginia. I'm sure the per-

son who wrote on this photo had personal knowledge, so I have changed my database accordingly. Robert & Annie lived in Vesper, Lincoln Co. Kansas. The writing on the photo also mentions Bob's grandparents, Zeno Summers and Blanche (Cheney) Summers and their first child, a daughter, Lillie Grace (Gracie) born in December 1897 in Lincoln Co. My husband's father, John Newton, wasn't born until Sept. 1906 in Colby, Kansas. Zeno & Blanche both died of the flu in Feb. 1907 leaving Gracie about 9 and John Newton Summers about 5 months, orphans. They were raised back in Lincoln County by their Aunt Nancy (Nannie) Summers Farr and her husband, Elias Farr.

John Newton Summers and Doris Pistole were married in Lincoln in Nov. 1927. John died of pneumonia (5 days before Christmas) in Dec. 1934, leaving my husband and his younger brother without a father. Their mother, Doris soon moved away from Lincoln Co. She was married twice more and through the years of moving around, apparently lost or threw out anything from Bob's childhood. He had no pictures of his father or grandparents, and in fact had never seen his father's headstone in the Vesper Cemetery until I found it there

while researching about 10 years ago. It was marked "Brother" so I feel sure that Gracie must have placed the stone years later, after Doris was long gone from there.

Now you can understand how pleased we were to have something tangible from his past and how grateful we are.



It Was A Success!!



What? The Kansas State Fair - Genealogy Program by Ruth Hair Filbert, Chairperson

I want to thank my fellow genealogists for their help in making this program a success. When it was suggested by Dennis Stoecklein, Kansas State Fair Manager, that the Reno County Genealogical Society have a program at the State Fair, we had no precedence to follow. This was an experiment to see if there was an interest in a genealogy program at the fair. The suggestion was made that we have programs on the first and second weekends and I tossed in the idea that maybe 100 people would attend, about 25 each day. The times were 1-3 p.m. on Saturday and 10-12 a.m. on Sunday. The average attendance was about 23. I think 31 was the highest attendance. There were people waiting for us each day, and people that came for a while or asked a question or two and went on. Except for the second Saturday, when it was HOT, we had comfortable temperatures in the "Oz Building".

Should we do it again, if we are asked? Yes! I know we impressed the Fine Arts department heads, that we could draw an audience. Could we make changes? Yes. I know I made changes each day as I learned that most of the audience had very little knowledge of genealogy and wanted to learn more. The people were from all over the state and with a little more advertising could draw a larger crowd.

Will it encourage more people to enter their genealogies? I hope it does.










Grandma's Wedding Dress

Mildred May Parrish, daughter of Bessie Erma Freeland and Walter Parrish, eloped from Partridge to Hutchinson and married George Skellenger on September 18, 1920. She married George in the same dress she graduated in earlier that year. It was made by her mother.

To get married George rode into town with his best man, Lee Metcalf, in Lee's car. May and her best friend, Lois Keesling, rode the Jittney into Hutchinson from Partridge. The Jittney was a small train line that ran through several small towns into Hutchinson.

May's mother did not want her to marry George as he was only a farmer and me-

chanic and didn't have much money. In later years Bessie and Walter adored George.

Their first home was in Partridge on the NW corner by the grade school. George farmed for many years before going to work for Reno County. He

drove a grader and parked it at home every night. May and George raised five children; Betty, Barbara, Robert, Jerry and Edith.


Grandpa always rocked us on his foot. He'd cross his legs and bounce us up and down. What fun! Grandma always wanted to learn something new. She never missed a space launch and she loved the Olympics. In her 80's she rode a motorcycle and horses.

No one knew grandma kept her wedding dress. It was after her death that it was discovered rolled up with a note pinned to it telling its history of being her graduation and wedding dress and having been made by her mother.

Grandpa passed away in 1952 and grandma in 1986.







GENERAL RENO CONFERENCE ROOM

On September 14, 2006 the new General Reno conference room was dedicated at the Reno County Courthouse. Located in the Southeast corner of the main floor it remembers the namesake of our county, Major General Jesse Lee Reno. Reno was born in 1823 in Wheeling, Virginia and died September 14, 1862, at the Battle of South Mountain. He is buried in Oakhill Cemetery in Georgetown, D. C.



David H. King & Susan Nation

David H. King, one of the representative agriculturalist of Reno County, Kansas, was born on May 7, 1849, in Suffolk County, England, and is the son of James and Susan Morley King, also natives of England. James King was a butcher by trade, which business he followed until death in his native country. He was the father of the children whose names follow: Henry, Samuel, Emma, Han-



nah, Mary, Louise, David, James, George Frederick and Isabella. James and George were twins. David, James and Frederick are the only ones of the family who immigrated to America.

David H. King received his education in his native country and, after six weeks on a sailing vessel, landed in Quebec, Canada, in 1869. The three years following his arrival he spent working for a wholesale firm in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island. This same firm sent him to Colorado, on July 2, 1872, as manager of a sheep ranch which they owned and he remained with them in that capacity for nine years. In 1881 he drove sixteen hundred sheep through to this county and has remained here ever since, following the sheep business as a permanent issue. The creamery business has also been a profitable undertaking, seventy-five gallons of milk a day having been sent to Swift & Company at Hutchinson. This business he continued for three years, discontinuing it in 1908.

On September 27, 1880, David H. King was united in marriage to Susan Nation, a native of London, England, and to them have been born three [sic] children, whose names follow: Richard J., born on November 25, 1881, died on June 20, 1882; Charles F., who married Emmie Kettle and now resides on his father's farm; William

D., June 12, 1884, who lives at home, and Susan, August 13, 1886, who married Samuel McLaughlin and is the mother of three children, Benjamin, Samuel and Eleanor.

Although David H. King has always been very active in civic and commercial life, he has never aspired to office, but has served his community in the capacity of township treasurer as well as a member of the township school board. As a citizen and man he stands high in the respect of his fellow citizens and numbers many friends among the residents of this section.

CEMETERY CORNER

Fairview Cemetery

Albion Township, Reno County, Kansas

The historical account of this cemetery was recorded in the cemetery book of the RCGS. In the early days a school was located on this land. A family traveling by covered wagon stopped and asked for help because their daughter had died. The teacher dismissed school and sent for a minister. A funeral was held and the child buried in the corner of the school yard. No marked grave is found for this child. In 1884 W. S. Clark deeded 1 1/2 acres for burial purposes. The land legal description is the SE corner of SE 1/4 of section 19-26-6. The cemetery was neglected and overgrown with prairie grass at the time of my visit.

The Fair, by its many names, has been a part of Reno County history since 1873


- 1873 Reno County Agricultural Society held a fair
- 1874 Tax levy voted down no fair [year of grasshopper invasion]
- 1875 1st Reno County Fair on grounds SE of present day Hutchinson Correctional Facility
- 1878 Fair held on grounds North of Eastside cemetery through 1880's
- 1885 Renamed The Arkansas Valley Fair Association

- 1900 Renamed Central Kansas Fair Association
- 1903 Central Kansas Fair recognized by act of state legislature and given license to call the event the "Kansas State Fair"
- 1911 Semi-centennial of Kansas joining the Union. President Taft spoke to a large crowd at the fair
- 1912 Purchased 112 acres N of 17th and E of Main Street
- 1913 First "Official" Kansas State Fair






