

Meetings of the Genealogy Group are planned for the third Monday of each month. They will meet at 7:00pm in Harris Kansas Room at the Hutchinson Public Library, according to Lurye Emig. The Meetings are open to anyone

Editor Note: Informal meetings of this group took place during 1977, and a questionnaire was sent out to interested people, and then in March of 1978 the first formal meeting took place.

Operational needs, ideas and thoughts of by the original four members of the 1977 committee and answers from the questionnaire were combined to form the basis of the new genealogy club. The following is the first saved "record" of this group. There was no date listed, but we assume it was in early 1978.

It is an interesting and entertaining read. Keep in mind, this was 40 years ago.

Transcribed as written

#### **ELECTED OFFICALS:**

The voice of opinion from the questionnaire was the number three. A President, Vice President and a combined Club Secretary-Treasurer. Thus, this small number could limit the business meeting to no more than ten or twelve minutes.

To the above three elected Offices, could be added a Co-Chaired 'Special Events Committee' who, when setting with the Officers would be known as the Club's 'Steering Committee.' This combined group would have the responsibility of all functions of the Club.

Monthly program planning: Workshop, Guest Speaker, Club Member telling of the steps taken to secure a copy of that not in existence document. Reports from a special club project function that has a bottle-neck needing the help of the entire club.

"The Special Events Committee' would then handle the News Media, out of town Library flyers on Guest Speakers, meeting arrangements, needs for tickets of offering, etc. Thus, all members of the Steering Committee would be informed of next month's activities.

To this, the Steering Committee, should appoint a short term Committee to meet and provide the Membership a simple set of By-Laws, Club Name or names to select from;, plus a yearly amount for dues that would maintain a balance large enough to purchase all supplies with a member using out of pocket monies. The dues could be flexible payments, as well as lump sum. When these items are completed, the committee could be adjourned, so when a short term committee is needed again, they may be recalled.

We feel all members used above, should be selected from that group of Club Members who work full or part time. This would leave those with time on their hands to serve on the Committees and Projects where we can only search during business hours, or 'Tween dawn and dusk'.

#### CORRESPONDING SECRETARY:

The requirements of this most important position should be fully explained to the membership and only awarded to one or two people who volunteer and are not employed. The requirements are:

An excellent typist

Five Years experience in Genealogy

One who will correspond with the out of town people who signed our Guest Register; requesting given names, dates, townships, States or Counties.

One who can compile a field searchers notes of a case like above and return the information.

One who would train a newcomer (who wants to help), how to compile the notes of a project researcher.

More items can be added, but lets not scare anyone.

All projects and committees should be Co-Chaired. We are blessed with people willing to help and all with experience. Pick two with difference experiences on the same subject, and we would be able to find all the answers.

#### LEGAL AND LIASON COMMITTEE:

The work of this committee would be to stay in advance of all projects; seeking written permission for our Project Members to be on City, County, Township, Church or private property of all old cemeteries.

This means having friends in the Courthouse and City Hall.

This same committee should be able to provide our Projects Workers with written permission to examine or copy all old City, County or Township records.

The small County Churches (with Cemeteries of their own), would require special permission.

The list grows endless.

For the above Committee, I would suggest Garland Henson, Art Graves, Jesse E. King, Steve Shorter and Everett Wells.

From this, it was decided that there should be three board members, a President, Vice President and a combine club secretary-Treasurer. And that this small number could limit the business meeting to no more than ten or twelve minutes.

# The second Executive Committee and Committee Chairmen met at the home of President, Betty Morgan on March 21, 1978 at 8:00 pm

Editor Note: The importance of this meeting cannot be understated. Members decided on club name change, future projects, etc. Editor has chosen to underlined these decisions.

Jesse King reported that HPL would let group use Kansas Room or Auditorium on 3<sup>rd</sup> Monday of each month.

Obituary file was discussed, with library furnishing a file cabinet. Obituaries were limited to Reno County and on 1" X 6" cards.

The group is having 2,000 family charts and 500 ancestral charts printed and to be sold at meetings, \$1.00 for 33 family charts and ancestral charges 3 for 25cents.

- Recommended and made a motion by Jesse King that the name of the organization be "Reno County Genealogy Society".
   Seconded by Art Graves motion carried.
- Everett Wells had a map of the county with different <u>cemeteries</u> listed, needs a list of willing workers to work and record graves in designated areas.
- Jayne Purcell reported that the <u>by-laws committee</u> would meet April 4.
- Motion made by Lurye Emig that the <u>dues</u> would be \$3.00 single, \$5.00 family Art Graves 2<sup>nd</sup> motion motion carried.

- Discussion concerning out-of-town speakers mileage and a small gratuity, to be given to speakers. The money to come from dues or contribution.
- It was discussed that we should try to encourage young people to join our organization.

A fee of \$3.00 per hour plus any expense incurred in copying and mailing for research requests sent to RCGS. There will be a minimum charge of \$3.00. Committee members doing research shall be reimbursed by the society for any out of pocket expenses.

### September 5, 1978 Executive Meeting Highlights

Jayne Purcell reported that she had contacted the Secretary of State with regard to incorporation the society – it would cost \$50.00. The society is automatically tax exempt until we make over \$5000.00 in one year. Discussion followed – it was decided to look into the matter further.

President, Betty Morgan discussed the possibilities of a <u>newsletter</u>. It was decided to gather ideas for possible items and discuss the item later.

# Graveyards are paths to past

To many, a graveyard is a solemn place.

It's a symbol of death, a reminder of the mortality of the human race.

But for Arthur Graves, Everett Wells and other genealogists, the cemetery represents life. It's the final step in the lives of ancestors, the final resting place beneath the now toppied gravestones under the tree or at the top of the hill of area cemeteries.

Graves and Wells have spent more than three years tromping through about 70 Reno County cemeteries, prodding tall grasses of forgotten plots or combing cemetery records with an entourage of about 65 helpers.

The men are members of the Reno County Genealogical Society. The Society will publish a book, "Cemetery Records of Reno County, Kansas — 1865-1978," this year.

The Society must have orders for the book by June 1 before it

can be taken to the printer.

The book isn't just for Reno County residents, said Graves, 1512 West Bianchard. Many people migrated to the Midwest from the

East and their descendants now are trying to find out where they died and where they were buried.

"You'd be surprised at the number of letters that come into the county at the cometeries, mortuaries or the courthouse requesting information on burials," said Wells, 608 East 8th. "Usually the letters are funneled to our society.

"In the past, we (the society) have written these people back with any information we could dig up. Now we can tell them about the book and they can do their own digging." Wells said.

The 425-page book will contain the names of about 44,000 persons buried in Reno County cemeteries and a map of the county showing the location of each cemetery. All names are listed alphabetically with a key to the burisi place.

The workers went to cemeteries armed with clipboards and paper. In smaller cemeteries which had no records, the compilers went from stone to stone writing down name, hirth date and date of death. If possible, the name of the spouse was listed. If the grave was for a young person, they were recorded as the "son or daughter of so and so," Wells said.

At the larger cemeteries, re-

cords of burials are kept and the workers recorded the same information. They recorded war records or lodge affiliations when possible. Other society members and Retired Senior Volunteer Programs (RSVP) members helped in the larger cemeteries.

The publication of Alex Haley's book, "Roots," is credited for the increased interest in digging for family tree information. But Wells asid many persons already were interested in genealogy and the book just brought them out of the woodwork.

Both men said it's never too late to get started in genealogy, but the sooner you start, the easier it is because sometimes the only record of events and transactions is in a person's memory. If the information isn't recorded, it's lost after the person dies.

"I don't know any genealogist

"I don't know any genealogist who doesn't say I wish I'd started this when Grandmother was alive." "Wells said.

The number of publications and books available to help the researcher has increased in the past several years. Graves said. New genealogical societies are being formed all the time and membership grows every year.

A society member has started clipping obituaries from the paper and placing them in a file in the Hutchinson Public Library as a continuation of the book. There also is a surname file available in the Harris Room of the library.

Wells is working on a book of Reno County marriage records.

"You're either really interested in genealogy or you're not at all." Wells said. "We're hoping our book will interest other counties and genealogical accieties in making books of their own."


Once people get started in genealogy, their whole lifestyle changes, Graves said.

# 1980 RCGS First Book Published Cemetery Records of Reno County,

The March 21, 1978 minutes listed the tentative committees to be formed. One of them was Cemetery Listings – with Everett Wells and Arthur Graves as co-chairmen. This was a big undertaking

Timeline of cemeteries reports, taken from minutes.

May 1, 1978 – cemetery Records – Out of the 40 cemeteries – 28 have been assigned to different people. June 5, 1978 - Out of 64 cemeteries - 19 cemeteries (4000 names) completed we will need help when it comes time to record the Hutchinson cemeteries. Forms to be used are being discussed with Lillian French and Melina Peterson who have compiled a book on a cemetery.

July 10, 1978 - Art Graves repots that the Cemetery Records Committee now has about 6000 names in their

September 5, 1978 - Arthur Graves and Everett Wells reported that it was to hot to continue with the cemetery records.

November 6, 1978 - Everett Wells and Arthur Graves reported that people were working 4 hours a day four days a week at the cemetery and that they really need to double the worker or it would drag into the sum-

February 6, 1979 – Cemetery records for Eastside cemetery are complete.

November 5, 1979 - Art Graves reported that the Cemetery Records were being typed now.

December 10, 1979 – Cemetery records are being proof-read.

February 4, 1980 – Art Graves said there were 2 boxes left to type and that we need proof-readers.

May 1980 - the "Cemetery Records of Reno County" book is scheduled to go to press the first week in June 1980. The orders are coming in. Many people have done much work on this project and it's a job well done. We are proud of our first attempt at publishing

### The RENO COUNTY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY of Hutchinson, Kansas proudly announces the publication of "CEMETERY RECORDS OF RENO COUNTY, KANSAS..."

425 page volume contains the names of some 44,000 persons buried in the 70 odd cemeteries, a map of the county showing the location of each cemetery, and complete description of each cemetery.

Burials began in the 1860's and continue through 1978.

# 1982 RCGS Second Book Published

## Early Marriage Records of Reno County, Kansas 1872 – 1913

The idea for a "Marriage Records of Reno County" book was first conceived in the spring of 1978, but it was in limbo until completion of the cemetery records book in March of 1980.

Hopefully it will be completed in the fall of 1982.

A check of the work book showed that more than 50 person donated valuable time to this project. There is no way to tell how many hours were spent copying, alphabetizing, checking, typing and checking some more. It was my responsibility to ask people to donate their time and with hardly an exception everyone did so and willingly. I would like to list each name, but with fear that I


would miss one person, I will extend to each person that helped my heartfelt thanks for accepting so willingly the challenge of helping with this worthy project. I am sure that each one of you will be proud to have had a

April 9, 1979 – Jim Arterburn said work on the Marriage record would begin later this summer after the work on the cemeteries was finished.

February 1980 – Jim Arterburn will welcome your help with the marriage records project. The information is being recorded from the microfilm. If you have a couple of hours to spare, call Jim at 663-2470 and volunteer to help.

March 1980 – Jim Arturburn resigned as Chairman of the marriage records project.

April 1980 - Everett Wells has been appointed chairman of the Marriage Records Committee. 1000 records have been copied. There are still 5000 records to be copied.



May 1980 – Everett Wells reports that the Marriage Records are 35% complete. He reports that he has a diligent committee hard at work recording the marriage records from microfilm. He says he has enough help for now, but if you want to work on this project, he will be glad to put you on his waiting list. Call Everett at 662-7852

July, August 1980 – Everett Wells declared a holiday from copying the marriage records during the hot weather.

October 1980 – the copying of the marriage records is about 70 % complete.

February 1981 – the marriage records have all been copied. They are being alphabetized and ready for typing

In 1982, a committee was set up by Lydia Streeter to extract marriage records from the this microfilm and put on 3X5 index cards.

Extractions of names from 1880 Federal Census of Reno County from microfilm, started in 1987 and book was completed in 1989. At the time this was published there was no printed index of this record. It was a very valuable asset to Reno county researchers.



Our Society has accomplished a lot during the previous 40 years. All of the publications took volunteers many hours and in some cases years to accomplish and get to publication. Until the internet came into being, one of the most common ways to find research sources was from books, books published by societies concerning information about past citizens of their counties.

Our books were ordered from all over America, and are in all of the largest genealogy libraries.

The RCGS no longer sells any books. Over the last year, 2017, we donated all of our remaining books to local libraries and libraries in surrounding counties.

Thanks to Rita Lingg, Sandy Wedman and Rebecca Head for their work in distributing the remaining books around Reno County and neighboring counties.

How was the printing of the RCGS publications possible for the newly formed society? It was because of a loan that was later forgiven by one of the early founders of the society, Malinda Peterson.

This money gave the society a reserve to establish the publication fund used for printing.

March 1982 – Lydia Streeter, Vital Records, reported the committee which includes Debbie Snyder, Jolene Cook, Delma Ashcraft, Leta Bechtel, Everett Wells, Carrolyn Miller and I have finished copying the birth record of Reno County 1872 – 1910 on 3X5 cards. They are now being proof read and the 1890 have been published in the quarterly.

July 1987 - Lydia Streeter presented the completed copy of "Deaths of Reno County, Book 1 and 2, to be placed on our shelves in the Kansas Room.

March 1984 – We have started the volunteer program in the Kansas Room of the Hutchinson Public Library in May 1983 with volunteers to assist people with their genealogy research on Tuesday and "Thursday afternoon and evening. We have increased our number of volunteer days to Sunday, Monday, Tuesday and Thursday 1-4 and Tuesday evening 7-9.

#### Malinda Peterson's gift

August 2, 1982 - Malinda Peterson state that an instrument is being drawn up to the effect that all monies need not be repaid in the event of her death.

February 13, 1984 – Art Graves has reported Malinda Peterson has forgiven our debt of \$2789.00. He stated Malinda wanted us to keep the newsletter going, not to make it any larger, around 12 pages, about what it is now. She feels this ia a must. She does not want the money put in general fund. Use our judgment. Use money for something special.

June 13, 1983 – Garland Henson reported the R.C.G.S. Newsletter was chosen on the top five newsletters in the United States. A Special Thank You to Jane Purcell and staff.

June 11, 1984 – Jayne Purcell reported 250 copies (12 pages) of the newsletter were printed at a cost of \$138.69. 2017 copies were mailed at a cost of \$11.28.

#### Our Postal Box Zip Code changed to 67504

July 13, 1983 - From Bruce W. Bryn Postmaster, US Post Office, Hutchinson,

In order to improve delivery service in our area, effective July 1, 1983, the box section at the Hutchinson Main Office has been assigned the ZIP Code 67504.

July 11, 1983 - Winnie Hendershot reported the new zip code for our Post Office Box is 67504-0005.

#### Surname File

May 3, 1982 - Surname File was first discuss.

January 23, 1985 – Carrolyn Miller reports her job description – She sends a letter with two ancestor charts to each new member. Also the new member's name and number are filed in my card index. When ancestor charts are returned to me, I fill out an index card for each person on the chart (up to ten generations). The cards are added to the Surname File in the Kansas Room of the Hutchinson Library at Hutchinson, Kansas.

#### Reno County Guide for Genealogy Research

August 2, 1982 – Danny Miller suggested a booklet on Reno County Genealogy sources would be a way to bring in more revenue.

April 5, 1983 – Danny Miller presented 100 copies of "Guides to Reno County Records" to the board. Printing and paper were donated to the society. Earl Green donated paper & Rick Miller donated the printing. Carrolyn Miller, moved to sell the guides for \$1.50 each. Motion passed.

# **Obituary Index**



The obituary file index was one of the earliest projects of the newly formed society.

The idea was to cut out and secure obituaries from the Hutchinson News on 3"X5" cards, and then file them alphabetically and according to years.


According to early minutes, only those persons having been born, married, lived or have died in Hutchinson was to be saved.

A committee was set up, headed by the obituary chairperson. The obituaries begin with May 1977.

This project took a lot of dedication and time to do. As the years passed, there was less volunteers and added cost for maintaining the project. As of 2008 the file cabinet have added no new obituaries. However, the present obituary coordinator, Dwayne Gobin, still extract names and dates from the obituaries in the Hutchinson News. This list is then listed on the RCGS website


Antioch Cemetery — Our first sign placement was at Antioch. We held a special dedication ceremony with a few of the caretakers and descendents. The cemetery is located in "Sumner Township, on Rayl Road, about 1/2 mile South of Silver Lake Road. For years this was an unkempt cemetery on the east side of the road, 2 & 1/2 north of St. Joe. No name was known for it. Later it was thought to be the Weise Cemetery—based most likely on a land owners name. An obituary called it the Antioch Cemetery. The condition of the site changed when Keith Neuway started take care of it in 1950's. Today you will find a visitor's register in the box attached to the flag pole. Thanks to Keith and all that help him mow and maintain it.!




Bainum Cemetery — Cemetery is located in Langdon Twp., on Andre Road abour 1/2 mile South of Irish Creek Road. Bainum Cem. Is one of a few family plots in the county. Local residents state that the ten people buried here are related to each other. In 1883, Oscar Bainum was the first person to be buried here.

Baker Cemetery — Located in Troy Twp., on Pleasant Valley Road about 3/4 mile East of Partridge Road. Baker Cemetery is located on a tract of two acres given by Fredrick W. Baker to Samuel Slack and trustees on April 16, 1878 for a burial plot. At the time of the survey conducted in the 1978 time-frame it was noted thee was evidence of 19 graves. There are no known cemetery records.



Buhler Municipal East Cemetery — Located in Little River Twp., on 82nd Ave [Dutch Ave] about 3/4 mile East of Worthington Road. Sometimes called Old Ebenezer Cemetery. Purchase in 1887 by the Alta Mennonite Church. There are many unmarked graves.

Fairview Cemetery—Located in Albion Twp., on the NW side of cross roads Whiteside Road and Boundary Road. Deeded for burial purposes in 1884. The cemetery is an inactive, unkempt, five marked graves

Haven Cemetery — Located in Haven Twp., on Castleton Road 1 1/2 miles East of Haven road. William Priest deeded land to the Priest Cemetery Association for burial purposes on July 11, 1888 although there were several graves on the land before that date. The earliest

person buried was Emmie Priest in 1990. Cemetery has been called Haven Priest for several decades.

Hazen Cemetery — The second sign in our project. Located in Plevna Twp., located on Jordon Springs Road about 1/2 mile South of Trail West Road.

Langdon Cemetery — Located in Langdon Twp., on Pleasant Valley Road, East of Langdon Road. Formerly called Maple Hill.

Old Langdon Cemetery — Old Langdon Cemetery, located in Langdon Township, on Sterling Road, 1/2 miles south of Arlington Road. This cemetery was used by the community before Langdon was opened. The land was set aside for burial purposes by Julius Elliott on Dec. 18, 1878

Lutheran Cemetery — Located in Huntsville Township, on Clark Road, 1/2 mile West of Langdon Road. Deeded in to Evangelical Lutheran St. Paul Church in March 1902. Used by people of German descent

Several times when installing the sign post, the land owners or others asked to assist. As of this writing, their names are unknown to this editor.


Pleasant Hill (Loda Twp) Cemetery — Located in Loda Twp. On Sun City Road, about 1/2 mile east of Sterling Road. Small old cemetery, transferred to trustees of Pleasant Hill Cemetery on 2 March 1886. Five grave stones on it, but thought to be many more graves.

Pleasant Hill (Ninnescah) Cemetery — Located in Ninnescah Twp. On the SW edge of Cheney Reservoir. From crossroad of Maple Grove and Yoder Roads, go North 3/4 miles. Cemetery Association purchased 9 March 1895. No Photo for this cemetery at this time.

Reformatory Cemetery — Located in Clay Twp., at the intersection of 'Avenue G & Hwy 61. Cemetery is a small plot of land located on the state-owned property of the Kansas Industrial Reformatory . Ther are several white stone crosses marking the graves of former inmates whose bodies were never claimed by relatives. Most markers have no names on them.

Thiessen Cemetery — Located in Little River Township, on Buhler Road, near Westport Avenue. About 1/4 mile South of 82nd Avenue [Dutch Avenue]. Small family burial plot believed to have been started in 1893. Holds 5

graves. Maintained through a foundation overseen by the Zoar Mennonite Church in Inman, Kansas.





Westminster Cemetery \_\_ Located in Westminister Twp., on Red Rock Road, 1/2 mile East of Highway 14. A neglected cemetery, most of the stones are lying on the ground. Only one large upright stone is probably the reason the plot has not been plowed. A neighbor has noticed that almost every Memorial Day a family comes to decorate one of the graves. Researchers found only 5 graves, could be more. In 2006 only one headstone visible.

West Center Cemetery — Located on the north side of Mills Ave. [Hwy 50] on the West side of the Hwy 50 & 61 interchange. Formerly called Amish Cemetery. Deeded to Amish Church Society of Center Twp. In 1900, Most graves are marked with identical, round-topped, white flat stones.

The Reno County Genealogical Society Inc. will be dissolving as a non-profit Incorporation later this year, 2018. Our group will still meet quarterly, keeping the name, Reno County Genealogical Society, to learn and share from each other and have general discussions about genealogy. What will change is there will be no need for board and committee members, treasurer's accounts and keeping of minutes. Our quarterly, The Sunflower, will be discontinued after this issue. A volunteer has offered to print an online newsletter, The Sunflower, that will be delivered via email for the time being. The RCGS website, where Reno County reference material will be available to view, will also be maintained by a volunteer.

RCGS Inc., was in existence from 1978 to 2018, that's 40 years. It has been a successful society, creating resources for Reno County reference material that will be used for many decades in the future.

Many genealogical societies are evolving or closing down. Time does not stop and neither does the way that genealogy is now being done.
